Local Happenings.

About thirty per cent. of the students went home yesterday to spend the Thanksgiving holidays.

This season, as in the past, photographer Graham is making a discount in prices during November.

Mr. Avard J. Woodman, of this town, has been appointed a deputy issuer of marriage licenses for Wolfville.

Messrs Burgess & Co. are having erected a new coal shed on the wharf on the site of the one destroyed by fire some years ago.

The grand opera entertainment in the Methodist church on Tuesday evening is said to have been a very pleasing and successful affair.

The west end Baptist church building on Quinpool road, Halifax, was almost totally destroyed by fire on Wednesday morning of last week.

Apple shipments for the week ending October 26th were 108,524 barrels. In the corresponding week last year the shipment was 154,560 barrels.

It is expected that Mr Galbraith, of the Halifax Presbyterian College, will conduct the services in the Presbyterian churches at Wolfville and Lower Horton on Sunday next.

A number of improvements are being made in the post-office. One in which the general public is most interested is the provision of additional electric light in the lobby.

Wolfville people will do well to remember to keep Friday evening, Nov. 8th, open for the Southwick recital in College Hall. This will be one of the most interesting events of the season.

The B. Y. P. U. Social, postponed from this week, will be held in the vestry of the Baptist church next Wednesday evening, at eight o'clock. An interesting programme is being prepared.

The annual reception given by the College Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. takes place on Tuesday evening of next week. It will be of especial interest because of the presence of the U. N. B. football team.

On Tuesday afternoon of next week the Acadia football team will play the U. N. B. team on the campus here. This should be one of the most interesting games of the season and will no doubt be largely attended.

New St. Andrew's church congregation received two very practical sermons from Rev. Mr. Wright, of Wolfville, on Sunday. In the evening the Orpheus Quartette sang two selections—"There is rest," and "Still with Thee."—New Glasgow Standard.

On Wednesday evening, Nov. 14th, the opening lecture of the College year, which was postponed because of the break-down of the town electric light plant, will be given by President Hutchinson. Further announcement will probably be made next week.

The Sixtieth Annual Session of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia opens at Halifax on Monday, Nov. 4th. With unwavering fidelity it has upheld and still upholds the principles of total abstinence for the individual, prohibition for the state.

Yesterday was a delightful day for Thanksgiving. The day was well observed in Wolfville. Nearly all the places of business were closed and Sunday quiet prevailed. The farmers and fruit-growers took advantage of the fine weather to make further progress with the harvest.

Mr Thomas Stafford, who has been engaged repairing sewing machines for some weeks, left on Monday to carry on the same line of work at Kentville. Mr. Stafford is a good machinist and that his work here gave excellent satisfaction is indicated by the numerous testimonials which he received. He expects to return to Wolfville in the spring for some weeks.

The well-known girl's club the T. T. S., of Wolfville, who in the past have many times successfully entertained their friends, held a Halloween party at the residence of Dr. DeWitt. After the guests were entertained with Halloween tricks, a lunch arranged on a tastefully decorated table was served. Before leaving the guests were presented with Halloween souvenirs.

Rev. Dr. William Dobson, one of the foremost Methodist clergymen of Eastern Canada, died on Sunday afternoon last at his home in Charlottetown, P. E. I., at the age of 61. Some time ago he suffered from an attack of typhoid fever but gradually recovered. A week ago he became ill and his condition grew worse. He was one of the ablest Methodist ministers in Canada and was the President of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island conference. His gifts were of high order and were cultivated with diligence, and he possessed a mind of more than average strength. Besides a widow the deceased is survived by three children.
