The School Board Replies.

DEAR SIR.—By letter in THE ACADIAN of January 3rd, 'A Parent' asks the School Board its opinion of the Course of Study pursued in the Wolfville High School. Correspondent states that any pupil in Grade XI shall take English and other five subjects optional.

When the present High School course came into force, the School Board, in agreement with the principal, decided that the subjects most suitable for Grade XI would be English, Latin, French, Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, and for IX, English, Latin, French, Geography, Arithmetic and Algebra.

For this reason, the few who enter Grade XI without foreign languages, must take one or two other subjects privately and, if necessary, employ a tutor. Ordinarily, two pupils do not need to resort to this plan; for they can pursue the full course decided upon as already indicated.
