Subject: Legal Rights of Separated and Divorced Wives.

Retraining

The divorced or separated woman must often retrain or acquire a new profession which she usually cannot afford, while her husband maintains his prestige and standing.

Children

Divorce and separation laws need to be changed. The courts should disallow the time allocations these fathers spend with their children, since the three days allotted is insufficient to retain an adequate father image and confuses the children. The amount of support should augment according to the number of children, and extend beyond age 18.
