Practical Guide on Canadian Company Law, by Walter E. Lear, barrister-at-law. This book contains the Dominion Companies Act as amended in 1918, together with elaborate information and directions relating to the incorporation, organization, and management of companies; and the forms and by-laws required for that purpose.

The many amendments which have been made to the Dominion Companies Act and to the corresponding Acts of the various Provinces have made company law so complicated that a condensed volume of this kind is practically essential in the organization and conduct of an incorporated business.

It is the only consolidation of the Dominion Companies Act since 1915, and there have been important changes in the Act since that date. Some of the changes relate to the formation of companies and societies not having gain for an object, and to the issue of stock having no par value, and to the filing of a statement in lieu of a prospectus.

The forms are very complete, and the notes of the author explaining these forms and giving useful directions as to the holding of
