closer relations with Himself, and so establishing pea This cannot be done on the ground of either the J or the Gentile. The Gentiles were not to become Je and adopt their laws and ceremonies; nor were the Je to go over to the position of the Gentiles. He rath establishes a new position for both. He sets up a new standard. He is our peace who hath made both one, a hath broken down the middle wall of partition. He gathe Jews out from their Judaism, and Gentiles out from the heathenism, joining both to Himself, so to make Himself of twain, one new Man, so making peace. T new position is outside of both Jews and Gentiles. forms a third great division of mankind, and now we har "the Jew, the Gentile and the Church of God." Th last is the new Man.

In order that in this new Man there might be perfer harmony and peace, and that He might reconcile both un God in one body, it was necessary that all existing barriers should be destroyed; and so Christ first of all dear with these. Having abolished in His flesh, the emmity even the law of commandments contained in ordinances. It that He might reconcile both nnto God in one body by the cross, having slain the emmity thereby. Thus in the new Man all causes of estrangement and bitterness between Jew and Gentile, and between both and God, are foreved done away. Thus we have God's way of making peace.

The mission of Christ was not to revive and restord Judaism, nor was it to reform and save the nations of their own ground. He will do that for both when He comes again to set up His visible kingdom on the earth. He will then deal with Israel and the Gentiles as such.
