

THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, SATURDAY, MARCH 23, 1839.

The news from the seat of border warfare is not important.

Mr. Jarvis, the temporary Land Agent, and who has command of the Maine forces on the Anrooktook, had arrived at Augusta, from the Disputed Territory. Not apprehending an attack from the New Brunswick forces, he had discharged four hundred men of his own. The remainder were engaged in constructing a boom across the Anrooktook, for the purpose of stopping the timber that might come down. General Hodson also the Kennebec troops. It was thought that the Legislature of Maine would approve of the views of Governor Fairfield, and would authorize him to keep a sufficient force in the Disputed Territory to prevent depositions. It is added—"If Sir John Harvey consents to this, there will be an end to our present difficulties."

A letter received at the Exchange this morning from a Montreal correspondent states that the two Nelsons have been hovering about the neighbourhood of Stanstead, and that Robert is proceeding along the frontier villages lecturing on Canadian wrongs.

The trial of eleven prisoners from the neighbourhood of Napierville, before the Court Martial at Montreal, terminated on Tuesday last; and on Wednesday three prisoners were put on their trial for the murder of Mr. Walker at La Tuque.

The House of Assembly of Nova Scotia has placed the sum of £1000 at the disposal of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor for the purpose of defraying the expenses of a Delegation to England, upon a mission of grievances.

CRIMINAL TERM.

The Criminal Term of the Court of King's Bench opened yesterday. The Hon. the Chief Justice and Mr. J. Stice Bowen were on the Bench. The names of the several persons who were committed to jail were called, and their recognizances were forfeited in consequence of the non-appearance of the parties. After the Grand Jury had been sworn in, the Hon. Chief Justice delivered an excellent charge, which we regret we are unable to give. The Grand Jury brought in true bills against Pierre Gagnon for burglary in the shop of Mr. Gillan, watch-maker, and Emelie Milman, wife of Bazile Plante, for stealing privily from the prison.

Gagnon was immediately arraigned, and pleaded Guilty. Emelie Milman pleaded Not Guilty, and the trial was fixed for to-day. It is understood that Mrs. Tasché, who is very unwell, will not be tried during the present term.

The Right Reverend Bishop Macdonnell, of Kingston, having recently been appointed an honorary member of the St. Andrew's Society of Montreal, has acknowledged the compliment, in terms highly gratifying to the loyalty and patriotism of the Society.

The proprietors of the steambot *Britannia* have been generously remunerated by Government for the use of that boat last fall, in conveying troops between Montreal and St. John, notwithstanding the principal proprietor, Hypolite Denand, figured as a Captain in the rebel army on the commencement of the last rebellion, and who fortunately for himself escaped to the United States.

Mr. Charles Hunter, who some time since left town, and was generally suspected to have assisted in or connived at the escape of Theliker and Dodge, returned a few days ago, and was yesterday committed to jail.

On Tuesday last, His Excellency the Governor-General and Special Council sanctioned the following Ordinances—

- An Ordinance to prolong the term of the Royal Charter incorporating the Quebec Bank, and to make further provision for the government and management of the said Bank.
- An Ordinance to abolish the practice of permitting defendants to traverse indictments, for misdemeanours, before Courts of Oyer and Terminer in this Province.
- An Ordinance to revive a certain Act therein mentioned, and to make better provision with regard to the inspection of Pot and Pearl Ashes.
- An Ordinance to provide for the more speedy attainment of persons indicted for High Treason, who have fled from the Province, or remain concealed therein, to escape from justice.
- An Ordinance to suspend an Act passed in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of His late Majesty George IV. intitled, "An Act for the relief of certain Religious Congregations therein mentioned," and to make other legislative provision in the place thereof.
- An Ordinance to suspend in part certain Acts therein mentioned, and to consolidate the laws relating to Duties levied under the Provincial Legislature.

There are now building in the different ship-yards of Quebec, twenty vessels, nearly all of large tonnage;—a greater number than has been built during any winter for many years past.

THREE-RIVERS, March 15.—The Criminal Term determined here on Wednesday last.—The Chief Justice of the Province presided for the first time since his promotion to the Bench, and his dignified demeanour won golden opinions from all sorts of people. The only trial that excited any interest, was that of a Canadian "patriot" for endeavouring to seduce a trooper of the King's Dragoon Guards to desert. The charge was proved beyond all manner of doubt by no less than three witnesses—by the trooper to whom the proposal of desertion was made; and by two Troop Sergeant-Majors, who apprehended the man in the act of conveying away the soldier (as he is thought) in the night time; but notwithstanding the distinctness of the evidence, and that the Chief Justice charged the Jury in

most positive terms to render a verdict of guilty, the man was acquitted by a Jury of his countrymen—French Canadians. The prisoner was defended by two "learned friends of the law," known one as "the learned friend" of tailor Teed, and the other as the coadjutor of "orator" Drolet. Too much praise cannot be given to the Dragoon Guards, who have, in every instance, resisted the efforts that have been made to them to desert, and several of the offenders they have already brought to justice.—Cor. *Montreal Gazette*.

Woodstock, March 9.—Our village has been like a military camp for the last ten or fifteen days; the militia are parading our streets—despatches are passing and repassing—troops arriving from below, &c.—All bearing very much the aspect of war. Two companies of the 69th Regiment, under the command of Major Brock, arrived here yesterday on sleds from St. John's having been forwarded with all speed immediately after landing from H. M. ship *Cypodille*. The remainder of the regiment are on the way.—Times.

The Montreal Volunteer Artillery, at their last practice, on the 7th instant, fired at different ranges of 200, 300, 400, 500, 600, 700, 750, and 800 yards; the result of which was, five shots through the centre of an apple's eye, and four very close to it, making nine shots in the target out of sixteen rounds.
