The Clydesdale is essentially a draughter, and therefore must possess weight. In selecting stock for breeding purposes this should be kept ever in view. Quality also is of paramount importance. The two are found combined in the ideal draught horse. The tendency has been to breed too many horses not up to weight, such as are spoken of as belonging to the agricultural class. These in value, fall far short of the draught horse. The mare pictured was a prize winner at Scottish Shows in 1908. Note her excellent underpinning, quality and weight.
