LOUISIANA CHEESE MARKET. Saturday, June 23, 1891.—This is the largest market of the season with 30 factories represented and a total of 6,243 boxes. The bidding received, and prices ranged from 8 to 13 1/2 cents. The *Crema* brand, in speaking of the cheese market last week was rather dull, but steady down to Friday, with a fractional advance on white stock, owing chiefly to the absence of strictly choice goods of that class.

And in looking at the market from the producers' standpoint, it would seem as if there ought to be no further decline this season. It is possible that a shortage will exist throughout the cheese-producing regions, and as that is a special production in a comparatively limited area, it is more liable to be short in the total yield than some articles of more general production. Today 2,000 boxes were sold at 8 cents per box, 1,200 boxes at 8 1/2 to 9 cents; 250 boxes at 10 to 11 cents; 500 boxes at 12 to 13 cents.
