great need of the camp is the reduction of its low grade ores so as to leave a fair margin of profit to the mine owner, and three of the largest mines are playing a waiting game, as they claim they cannot afford to have their ores' smelted at the prevailing prices. What is also needed is cheaper transportation facilities. The C. P. R. could give the necessary low rates provided it had a line to Robson, but it has no such line at present and is, therefore, as Vice-President Shaughnessy has said, not a factor. It has, however, promised to do something in the future.

In the meantime the Le Roi company is about to erect a smelter at Northport and the promise is held out that it will be built with the special purpose of reducing the low grade ores of this camp the miner.
