## BILL TO PROHIBIT GAMBLING IN WHEAT

Congressman Mann, Believing in Government Control Over Farm Commodities, Will Introduce Important Measure

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The Chicago board of trade, now and the members of the grain exchange in various parts of the country are facing a new peril, and one that may drive them out of business. Congressman Mann, of Iowa, has introduced a bill in the House to prohibit the transmission of interstate and foreign messages relating to futures in agricultural products or commodities and dealing in such messages.

Congressman Mann is firmly of the conviction that a law of this sort will be constitutional, and that in this country the Government will be given control of different phases of gambling of wheat and other staples. The measure is intended to be of benefit to the producer, though, of course, it would be bound to benefit the consumer as well.

## EXPORT DUTY ON ELECTRIC POWER

Any Company Supplying Canadian Consumers at Reasonable Rates May Be Relieved of Duty.

OTTAWA, Jan. 4.—The Dominion Government has decided to put an export duty on electric power. When parliament reassembles Hon. A. B. Aylesworth will introduce a bill providing that no company can export power out of Ontario without a license. These licenses will be granted and regulated by the Governor-in-Council. The Government will have the power to place an export duty on power, with a provision that any company that is supplying Canadian consumers with power at reasonable prices will be relieved from paying this export duty.

At present there are a couple of Niagara power companies that export all they produce to Buffalo. In future they will have to supply a certain percentage to Canadian consumers or face an export duty which will be practically prohibitory. Another Niagara company supplies Toronto with power, and, of course, it will not only keep Canadian power to Canadians, but to some extent will prevent the desertion of Niagara.

At today's meeting of the Cabinet two county judges were appointed for British Columbia. John R. Brown takes the place of Judge Clements in Yale and Kootenay, and Fred Calder, of Ashcroft, succeeds Judge Cornwall in Carleton.

## COAL SEAM ON FIRE

Efforts Being Made to Extinguish Extensive Blaze in Alberta Mine.

EDMONTON, Jan. 7.—Mr. J. A. L. McDougall has returned from a trip up the Saskatchewan. He was about sixty miles up the river engaged in extinguishing a fire that has been smouldering in a seam of coal since the 23rd of August. The coal outcrops on the north bank of the river in section 15, range 4, west of the 5th meridian and is owned by McDougall and Seord and the C.P.R. The seam is about 22 feet in thickness and shows a face of about 400 feet dipping into the river eastward. The fire originated from a prairie fire and obtained a ready means of access by several excavations that were formerly made in the bank.

Mr. McDougall set a gang of 13 men at work digging and picking up until a trench 22 feet deep and 400 feet long separated the burning coal from the main seam. He says it is a most beautiful sight to see the seam stripped and showing a black glistening face 400 feet long alongside the river bank. The coal is of excellent quality and is being used by the blacksmiths in their forges in the lumber camps.

A seam some nine miles up the river has been burning for nine years and there seems at present no possibility of ever getting it under control.
