London, September 15.—Lord Roberts reports that Gen. Buller has arrived at Spitzkop, where he captured considerable supplies.

Gen. Rundle wires that he has arrived at Bethlehem.

The Boers attacked a company of engineers with an escort of nineteen Hussars, at Crocodile River, northwest of Pretoria, The engineers escaped, but I have no news of the Hussars.

A strong force of Boers has aban-doned a position commanding Dod-win, near which place Gen. Polehunt for the boxes so generously dispatch ed to the Chatham boys at the front in win, near which place Gen. Pole-Carew is operating.
Gen. Hart occupied Potchefstroon, southwest of Johannesburg, on September 11th, completely surprising the Boers by a forced march of 45 miles. He captured all the garrison except a few.
Gen. Clements drove Commandant Delarcy yesterday north of Mayliesberg.

WIPING THEM OUT. London, Sept. 15.—A Pretoria despatch says:—The eastward advance of the British is moving on in a broad sweep, seventy miles long, through broken valleys and mountains of the Transvaal. Gen. French is at the extreme southern point tois at the extreme southern point to-wards Barberton, with Gen. Hutton supporting him. Gen. Pole-Carew is wards based on the care with the centre at the railway near Goodwin River. Gen. French's advance has been strongly opposed. In the extreme north Gen. Buller has had magnificent success and has driven the Boers over the passes towards Spitzkop. Gen. Ian Hamilton is supporting Gen. Buller. The Boers who were at Warmbath, appear to have retired to the northward. The system of garrisoning towns with field forces for surrounding districts is meeting with great success. Gen. is meeting with great success. Gen. Methuen is clearing the country road to Zeerust. Gen. Clements is between Krugersdorp and Rustenburg; tween Krugersdorp and Rustenburg; while Gen. Barton is near the former place. Gen. Bradley is at Heidelberg. The British commanders hope that within the next two weeks the Boers' headquarters in the east of the Transvaal will be surrounded or commandoes dispersed. Then the final quelling of the opposition to the British in various districts will, it is thought, be speedily accomplished. Warm weather will soon make it impossible for the Boers to keep their cattle in the brush veldt, and they are already driving them south. Small bands of Boers continue to threaten attacks on the railway south and east. The railway is too strongly guarded, however, for them

DROP PROHIBITION.

The New Party in Toronto Found

it Unpopular. Toronto, September 15.-The People's Party, organized a couple of weeks ago, by labor, temperance and social reform delegates, and which adopted prohibition as one of its planks in the Toronto campaign, has found prohibition decidedly unacceptable to the unions. At a meeting last night the temperance representatives being absent, a resolution was passed rescinding the prohibition plank and substituting one favoring the New substituting one favoring the New Zealand law, which provides for a vote of the electorate every three years on the question of sale and manufacture. If a two-thirds majority says "no sale," there is prohibition; if a bare majority, licenses may be reduced in number; if a minority, there is no change.
