INJUNCTION SERVED

Two Railway Companies After Charter in Lincoln County.

St. Catharines, July, 23.—A special meeting of the county council was held here this morning to consider the by-law to permit the Hamilton, Grimsby & Beamsville Railway to extend the road from Beamsville to Vineland over the Queenston & Grimsby stone road. The Niagara, St. Catharines & Toronto Railway, which got the franchise at a former meeting of the council, have, it is claimed, failed to comply with the provisions of the by-law, and also neglected to put up a cash deposit, which the warden and councillors demanded, a guarantee bond having been offered in place of the cash, but refused. The warden stated that as the Niagara, St. Catharines & Toronto Railway people had not complied with the conditions of the by-law it had lapsed. As the council was discussing the question, Sheriff Dawson entered and served an injunction on the members on behalf of the Niagara, St. Catharines & Toronto Railway Company, restraining them from taking any action or passing any resolution by-law to repeal, amend or modify the said by-law, and to restrain the council from granting any franchise to any other person, firm or corporation, to the prejudice of the plaintiff. The council at the afternoon session gave the by-law of the Hamilton, Grimsby & Beamsville people its first and second readings, and then adjourned until the injunction, which is to be argued before Judge Carman next week, is disposed of.
