Strangled.

Hamilton, O., April 27.—While two patrolmen were passing the residence of Charles Hunter yesterday they heard, faintly, sounds of distress inside the house. An investigation revealed Mr. and Mrs. Hunter almost strangled and crushed and lacerated within a collapsed folding bed.

The bed had closed like a pair of shears, doubling up the occupants, half-suffocating them, and strifling their cries. They were in great agony, and were with difficulty extricated from the clutches of the bed, where they had been held almost all night.

Scant Courtesy to Peasants. St. Petersburg, April 29.—The deputation of Conservative peasant members of the Lower House of Parliament was received by the Emperor yesterday at Tharskeo-Salo, and returned in a disappointed mood at the scant ceremony with which they were

received.

They were bunched in a big delegation of military men and Constitutional Democrats, and were greeted with the usual perfunctionary expressions of His Majesty's pleasure at meeting his subjects.

The Emperor did not give the spekesman of the peasant delegation an opportunity to deliver the loyal speech which he had prepared.

Angry Mee Fight Werkers.

Cheveland, O., April 29.—The first bleed was shed Saturday in the trouble between the American Shipbullding Co. and its striking employes. Three hundred angry men and women waited at the gates for the non-union men to leave. A fight ensued when the workers came out, in which several men were injured, one perhaps fatally. A patrol wagon leaded with police arrived in time to avert a dangerous riot. John Marion, a strike-breaker, the man most seriously injured, was taken to his home. He says he was attacked by several men. He may die.

Canada May Demand Free Port in Alaska From U. S.

Foreign Secretary to Confer With Sir Wilfrid Laurier On United States Questions-Canadian Negotiations Giving Trouble-Secretary Root Has Widely Different Views-Must Buy Out Sealers.

London, April 29.—Foreign Secretary Grey is taking advantage of the presence of the Colonial Premiers in London to obtain the first-hand views of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Robert Bond on the questions pending between the United States and Canada and Newfoundland respectively.

The Secretary already has had one conference with Sir Robert, but it was largely taken up with the discussion of the modus vivendi, which the United States and Great Britain signed to cover the last fishing season, and to which the Newfoundland Premier strenuously objected on the ground of "interference with the rights of the colony."

Against Interference.
Further interviews will occur, looking to the permanent settlement of the fisheries dispute. It is recognized that this is not easy of accomplishment, as there is a strong sentiment against any interference of the Imperial Government with the affairs of the colonies.

The Canadian negotiations are giving the Foreign Secretary even more trouble than those in which Newtoundland is interested, but every effort will be put forth to bring about an agreement. Premier Laurier has been too busy thus far with the Imperial Conference and special engagements to discuss questions with the Foreign Office, but he has made an appointment with the Foreign Secretary for the coming week when the whole matter will be gone over.

Sir Wilfrid expressed to the Associated Press his satisfaction with the hands in which the negotiations were left, and spoke hopefully of the outcome, but from other sources it was learned that there are wide differences of views between United States Secretary of State Root and the Canadians. Demand Compensation.

In almost every case the Canadians demand some national compensation in return for what taey are asked to concede. As an example, to give up pelagic sealing they not only ask the United States to buy out the sealers, but also want a further concession from the United States, which might take the form of a port in Alaska to give traders an entry into the Canadian Yukon district without passing through American territory.

Athens, April 29.—A detachment of
Turkish troops and a band of Greek
brigands had a sharp flight April 28
near Merihaven in Macedonia. The

and twenty Turks were killed. The depression which prevails in the cities of South Africa is without parallel.

Business is paralyzed in Cape Town, Johannesburg and Durban, and the newspapers are filled with reports of creditors' meetings and announcements of sales of bankrupt stocks and furniture. Hundreds of offices and sheps are untenanted.

George Valder, who represents the Government of New Bouth Wales, states that during the last 12 months 5,800 people have sailed for Australia from Cape Town alone. He estimates that another 3,000 have left Durban for the same destination. They returned at their own cost. There are hundreds of others who would leave if they had the means.

A few days ago, at the request of Mr. Valder, the mayors of the chief South African cities invited Australians who wished to return and had not the means to send in their names and addresses. Six hundred gennine cases have already been reported from Johannesburg. 200 from Durban, and about 200 in Cape Town.

All these are to be granted free passages to Australia, and the authorities in Johannesburg are so glad to get rid of the surplus population that they have communicated to Mr. Valder their willingness to pay the fares of the stranded Australians to the port of embarkation.

Prince Hohenlohe refers to Prince William (the present Emperor) in the following words: "He is rather boyish, incomsiderate young man of whom his mother is atraid. He also has rows with his father."

On Sept. 22, 1888, Prince Hohenlohe was received in audience by the Empress Augusta Victoria, the wife of William I. "Sine was," he says, "very broken down and sad. We began by discussing the Emperor's last days, and then she became animated, and spoke of the malificousness and the disgraceful behavior of certain people whom she mentioned by name.

ITALY FAVORS LIMITATION. Attitudes of Powers At Coming Hague

ne, April 29.—The discussion that has been going on concerning the Italian proposition of the limitation of armaments has served in a measure to elucidate the attitudes of the var-

of armanents has set in a manner to elucidate the attitudes of the various powers on this subject.

Great Britain, which is the only country to send a Minister of Foreign Affairs to the conference, is in favor of the discussion, and in this she is thoroughly supported by Spain.

Russia, while insisting on the discussion of its own program of April 12, 1906, agrees with Germany and Austria on the question of armament to the point to referring to it in official documents as "An entente," but Russia is favorable to any step that is likely to result in a correct and reasonable solution of the matter.

Germany and Austria do not favor the limitation of armaments: they

will, however, permit the presentation of the proposal, although they are not willing to participate in its discussions.

France, there is reason to believe, is of the opinion that here exists international as well as internation reasons against limitation, but she will allow the presentation of the question She has not yet decided whether to participate in the discussion or not.

The situation of Italy is delicate and difficult. The general opinion is in favor of limitation, but Germany has called upon her to fulfil the duties of an ally. There is no desire to have a repetition of the Algeciras incident when rightly or wrongly, Germany accused Italy of having deserted her. Consequently Italy is very much interested in bringing about an understanding on this subject prior to the opening of the conference.
