International Bible Lesson for Tomorrow.  
Daniel and Belshazzar.—Daniel 5, 17-30.

Golden Text.—"The face of the Lord is against them that do evil."—Ps. 34, 16.

We again study an incident in the life of Daniel. Two weeks ago we left him a youth promoted by Nebuchadnezzar to the Council of the Empire. We found him in this lesson over 60, having spent more than 40 years witnessing for God in this idolatrous Empire: City of Babylon.

Teachers and scholars should read prayerfully right through this wonderful book of Daniel. We find Satan then, as now, one way or another, deceiving nations, and he will keep at it until he is bound.—See Rev. 20, 3.

Nebuchadnezzar's grandson, Belshazzar, now reigns. He is a proud, ungodly, sensual ruler. While the armies of the Medes and Persians, under Darius, are besieging his capital, he has such faith in its immense walls and strong gates, surrounding enough land to sustain its inhabitants, that he makes a great drinking feast in the palace, and goes out of his way to insult God Almighty, by bringing the golden and silver vessels captured from His temple at Jerusalem to drink from in this drunken carousal. Suddenly, amid shouts and praises to their old heathen images a phantom finger writes on the most conspicuous place in his banquet hall a mysterious, startling sentence. The king's face drops, his brain reels, his joints are loosed, his knees smite together, his fears chill him to the bone, his doom has come, and he cries out for help from his poor, deluded wife men, who are fools like himself before God.

If there is any lesson taught clearly, both in scripture and in history, it is that swift rain sweeps the man whose heart is lifted up in pride. When any man becomes proud and boastful his doom is sealed. God, in mercy, must humble him to the dust, that he may know that the Most High ruleth in the kingdom of men.

If Belshazzar had before him—see Jonah 3, 6-10—or as Nebuchadnezzar—see Dan. 4, 34-37—there would still have been mercy for him.

Reader, teacher, scholar, remember God is now weighing us in His balances. Eternal life or death—which shall it be? Accept the Lord Jesus as your personal Saviour and "my God shall surely all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus." He alone turns the scales in our favor.

RUSSIA ALARMED.

Over the Terms of the New Anglo-Japanese Treaty.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 25.—The first comment heard here on the Anglo-Japanese treaty can be conservatively characterized with the word "alarm."

It was fully expected that it would prove to be a very significant and important document. The first study not only confirmed this view, but strengthened it. It is too soon yet to give any full report of how it was received in Russia, and when officials were questioned on the subject yesterday the invariable answer was that it was too soon to express an opinion in such a weighty and important matter.

The use of the terms "protection of common interests" and "measures which should be taken," are regarded here as being open to any interpretation the signatories desire to give to them. Also coupled with the use of the words "East Asia," apparently applying to all Asia east of India, including the East Indian Islands and Indo-China, they are considered to prove clearly that the signatories purpose to act in the part of the word specified with the freest kind of a hand. This conviction cannot but create alarm in Russia.

Berlin, Sept. 28.—The Anglo-Japanese alliance in its extended form is regarded by some commentators as tending to bring Russia and Germany closer together. Germany seeks close agreements with Russia and Russia may feel the need of such agreements in consequence of the extension of the British-Japanese alliance.

Paris, Sept. 28.—The Anglo-Japanese treaty was widely commented upon yesterday. The official view is that the treaty is conformable to French interests. It is pointed out particularly that France does not seek territorial expansion in Asia and therefore the status quo provisions of the treaty carry out French policies.
