

Port Said, Sept. 29.—The wreck of the British steamer Chatham, which was sunk in the Suez Canal September 6, in order to prevent an explosion of a large quanti, y of dynamite, which formed part of the cargo while the ship was menaced by flames, was blown up yesterday morning.

No serious damage was done to the canal, and the authorities anticipate that the passage will be cleared of de-bris in four days.

The enormous displacement of water

was visible from a spot five miles distant, whence the operations of blow-ing up the vessel were conducted. A huge column of water, sand and the ship's wreckage was thrown 2,000 feet in the air, and in falling destroyed 600 feet of the east bank of the canal.
