The committee in charge of the  
Christmas tree for the children of  
the unemployed miners which took  
place with great success on Christ-  
mas eve in the Dominion hall, here-  
with submit their report of receipts  
and expenditure of gifts to the chil-  
dren.

In doing so they tender their sin-  
cere thanks to the citizens who so  
generously contributed to the suc-  
cess of the event and lightened the  
burden of the committee in many  
ways.

Income as follows:  
Donation from Jingle Pot local,  
\$115.00; receipts from friendly  
sources, \$100; cash contributions  
from citizens, \$265; contributions in  
goods (approximately) \$160; con-  
tributed by a friend, \$22.60; total  
\$662.60.

The value of the above has been  
distributed as follows:  
Fed 700 children and provided each  
child with a bag of mixed candy and  
fruit; sent 30 hampers to homes in  
need of same and distributed 500 use-  
ful presents to children of unemploy-  
ed miners, comprising the following  
articles: 129 suits of underclothing,  
104 pairs of shoes, pair of slippers,  
three boys suits, 80 pairs of boys'

pants, 88 sweaters, 74 pairs of stock-  
ings, 28 dresses, four night dresses,  
three remnants of flannellette, 24 boys  
caps, 14 pairs of gloves, six mufflers,  
baby feeder bib, five boys' blouses,  
six handkerchiefs, drinking mug, five  
large cases of oranges, eight Japan-  
ese boxes of oranges, ten boxes ap-  
ples, 50 pounds nuts, 143 pounds can-  
dies, 49 pounds sugar, 22 pounds but-  
ter, 15 fowls, 85 pounds ham, three  
pounds tea, one pound coffee, six tins  
cream, 194 loaves of bread, 20 cakes  
one leg pork.
