FAREWELL TO PASTOR.

Rev. W. J. H. Brown Honored by Barton St. Baptists.

Two Presentations Made at Meeting Last Night

And Many Expressions of Love and Good Will.

The little Baptist Church on Barton street east was crowded to the doors last evening, when the congregation gathered to bid farewell to Pastor Brown, who in his two years' ministry among them had completely won his way into their hearts, and had been used of God in bringing blessing to many souls. Long before time for the opening of the meeting the many friends of the pastor and his wife had crowded into every available seat, and those who were a little tardy in arriving had to stand throughout the service.

On the platform with Pastor Brown were many of the Baptist ministers of the city, among the being Revs. W. Quarrington, H. McDiarmid, R. McWhirter and Jas. Bracken.

Rev. Mr. Bracken, of Ferguson Avenue Baptist Church, in a short speech, emphasized the fact that the important thing to-day is full acknowledgment of Jesus Christ as the Lord. Referring to the occasion on which they had gathered, he spoke very highly of Pastor Brown, assuring the people that their loss would be some one else's gain. Mr. Brown would be sure to win his way into the hearts of the people to whom he had been called, and he felt sure that it was God's mind that he should be sent to his new field of labor.

Rev. W. Quarrington spoke of the friendly relations which existed between Pastor Brown and himself. He loved him and admired him for his faithfulness to the truth, inasmuch as he had not failed to present Christ and Him crucified to the people. He spoke of the retiring pastor's zeal in Christian service, and entrusted the congregation to be generous in their idea of things, and to believe that God was leading their minister into larger spheres of activity. "Stand true," he said, in conclusion, "and continue the work which has been begun among you. Do not let us become your pastor is leaving. Work for a new church, for if any part of Hamilton needs more church accommodation it is surely this section."

Mr. Quarrington expressed the feeling of Westworth Street Baptist Church in wishing Pastor Brown every success in his future work.

Rev. Mr. McDiarmid, of Herkimer Baptist Church, went back to the old college days, when he and the one of whom they were taking leave had studied together in Woodstock College. He pleaded with the people to be as loyal to the new pastor as they had been to the old, and dwelt on the importance of a larger building, as he believed their progress was being hampered for lack of room.

Rev. Mr. McWhirter, of Crown Point Baptist Church, in a few words told of his esteem for Mr. Brown. He could remember the advice he got from him on the occasion of their first meeting. It was simply this: "Be a praying pastor." He could say he had carried out the advice, and presented upon his hearers the great importance of prayer. "Keep together, be of one accord in all things, and blessing will be yours," were his closing words.

The choir during the evening rendered many beautiful selections under the able leadership of Mr. Ivor Pritchard. Miss J. Fellows was soloist.

The event of the evening was the presentation to Mr. and Mrs. Brown of an address by Miss Near and Mr. P. Kemp, accompanied by a beautiful easy chair and a lamp, presented by Mrs. Brown. The address expressed the tenderest regard for Mr. and Mrs. Brown, appreciation of their devoted work, and God's blessing on their future.

Mr. Brown in reply thanked the members of his church and his wife for their love and cheer at such a trying time. Never had a parting been so keenly felt by him. He had grown to love the people whom he was ministering to, and no one would know but that he had shed them from his heart for the gifts, though to him they were nothing compared with the love and good-will behind them. His ministry in the little Barton Street Church had occupied to the happiest years of his life, and he did not wish for a more loyal people than they had been to him. There had been little troubles, but love had overcome them all, and fellowship had been sweet between his people and himself.

He assured them that, though absent in body, he would still be with them in spirit, and would assist them with his prayers. He was very glad that they had brought no pressure to bear upon him to reconsider his decision, because he believed God was behind it, and adding, referring to his wife, "I am glad to see your life and ambition to please God. He spoke very affectionately of the fellowship and good-will of the pastors present, and, concluding, asked his people to take him as a parting message a verse in I. Cor. xv. 58: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, stand fast in the Lord, always abounding in the work of the Lord, inasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

Deacon T. McLean then presented the pastor with an address.

After the pastor had briefly responded, Mr. Ivor Pritchard presented him with a beautiful oil painting of the church, the work of Miss E. Smith, saying that he trusted it would bring back sweet memories of his labors here.

Mr. Brown was much affected by this last token of love and replied feelingly, to such a piece of work and assuring his people that it would have a prominent place in his study.

The meeting closed with the singing of two very beautiful and appropriate hymns, "Go With You Till We Meet Again" and "Blest Be the Tie That Binds."

Pastor Brown leaves this week to take up his duties in his new field of labor.

FATHER KILL D IN DETROIT.

Aired Padfield, of London, was killed in Detroit on Sunday night last.

STAND TOGETHER.

Speech of Governor Aram J. Pothier Before Canadian Club of Boston.

On Friday last Governor Pothier spoke on "Canada and the States" before the Canadian Club of Boston. It was an eloquent plea for friendly relations between these two countries. He said in part:

Allow me to ask whether Canada does not, by proximity, geography, the character of her industries, and by the natural and artificial navigable waters that border her territory on the south, east and west, belong to the common industrial system of this continent? I believe that she does, and I share the conviction of an eminent American statesman, that God never intended that the provinces of the Dominion should be industrially or commercially separated from the United States.

I am one of those who believe that the United States and Canada should be brought into a closer relationship in their affairs. With natural interests in common, and each liable to reap advantage or to suffer loss through the same agencies, both are handicapped in exercising that co-operation so manifestly desirable, by the difficulty of establishing practical working relations.

Never before has the necessity for a closer union, if not a federal union, between these two countries been greater, nor more keenly felt. If the United States and Canada desire peace, for the extension of their trade and the security of the Pacific slope, they must maintain and display a strong navy—strong in its fighting units, adequate in its transports and coalers. Canada as well as the United States must be equipped with the means for coast defence, if she is to do her share in impressing the world with the mightiness of this continent.

And thus it becomes the duty of American and Canadian statesmen to foster and encourage always the most amicable and intimate relations between the two countries, that the problems affecting the future of the continent may be more easily solved; that the destiny of both, whether that destiny be political union or commercial reunion, may be gloriously accomplished; and that we may make common cause for the defence and protection of our civilization before and not after the hour of danger shall threaten.
