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STEALING AT DUNDAS.

Fruit Owners and Milk Men Are the Victims.

Dundas, Sept. 27.—Some boys in the town will find themselves in serious trouble some day for stealing fruit from citizens and surrounding farmers, if they do not desist. A bunch, especially brazen and bold in this respect, lives in the east end. They persistently make raids on the gardens of their neighbors, and one day recently when the woman of the house discovered them just as they were about to depart with their baskets well filled, the marauders retreated to a safe distance to the back of the lot, and from there gave impudence to the lady and amused themselves with pelting at her the fruit which they had pilfered. The police have been notified and will no doubt put an end to such depredations by boys and others too old to be called boys.

NOT HOPEFUL.

Unionists in England Do Not Expect to Win.
London, Sept. 26.—Unless all prophets are at fault, Great Britain will be in the throes of a general election shortly before or soon after next Christmas. The political excitement which began with Lord Rosebery's denunciation of Lloyd-George's budget as rank Socialism, and Premier Asquith's rejoinder that it was a poor man's budget, was carried to the highest pitch during the past week by a speech by former Premier Balfour, in which the Unionist leader was understood to have called upon the House of Lords to reject the financial proposals of the Government.

New Orleans, Sept. 25.—Section hands on the L. & N. Railroad found the bodies of thirty-six sailors and fishermen near Dundar station late to-day. This brings the total number of dead resulting from last Monday's hurricane up to approximately 200. The bodies were badly decomposed and were buried on the old track bed without identification.

His third wife, Cohen married Miss Berner in Arthur, and the couple lived in Toronto for a time, then going to Cleveland, where a child was born.

A SUPER-DREADNOUGHT.

Kaiser's Great Warship Heligoland Launched at Kiel.

Berlin, Sept. 26.—The Kaiser's first super-Dreadnought, christened the Heligoland, was launched at Kiel yesterday. The dimensions have been kept heretofore secret, but it is admitted that the Heligoland is in every respect equal to the latest 20,500-ton British Dreadnoughts. She will carry the enormous crew of 1,800 men, and will be armed with twelve instead of eleven-inch guns. Next week the Oldenburg, another super-Dreadnought, will be launched at Wilhelmshaven, making the seventh all-big-gun ship Germany has floated within nineteen months.

NEWS IN BRIEF

The Heligoland was launched within nine months after her laying down, and the Oldenburg will not be any longer than this on the stocks. Nothing could indicate more strikingly the tremendous progress in German ship-building facilities within three years.
In 1906 the heaviest battleship any German yard was capable of turning out was of 12,200 tons. In line with the policy of inviolable secrecy now prevailing with regard to naval affairs, it has just been officially announced that the cost of the new battleships will not be made public in advance hereafter, in order that foreign navies may not be able to calculate their size from the amount invested.
Henceforth the Admiralty will keep the cost a secret until the final installment is asked for in the Reichstag. A German Dreadnought hitherto represented an investment of over \$9,000,000. The super-Dreadnoughts, it is believed, will cost at not less than \$12,000,000 of tied-up capital.
