On Nov. 3rd a very interesting game of Rugby was played between the College fifteen and U. N. B. The field was in fairly good condition, but too muddy to allow much fast or open play. At the end of the first half neither team had scored, but in the second U. N. B. rushed the game and scored two tries in quick succession in the middle of the half. Neither of these was converted. Though King's defence was excellent, her men were unable to get away and do anything in the line of scoring. The tackling of our halves held the score down considerably, but the game ended 6 to 0 in favor of the visiting team. In the evening the visitors were entertained by the students and their friends at an At Home given in the gymnasium. The Students' Missionary Society has decided to send at least two delegates to the Mens' Missionary Convention to be held in Halifax on the 22nd, 23rd, and 24th of this month. During the coming year the Society hopes to secure some of the men prominent in Missionary activity to deliver addresses for the benefit of the students and the people of Windsor generally.
