Party-Line Consideration

A two-party line is a single circuit, shared in common by two subscribers. It is not reserved for a single user and should be used on the share-and-share-alike basis.

On a two-party line, it is possible for both users to try to talk out on the same circuit at the same time. There is also the liability of both being wanted at the same time to receive incoming calls.

Therefore, there are special considerations which we urge a party-liner user to keep in mind:

1. Long conversations prevent the use of the line by the other subscriber; therefore party-line talks should be as brief as possible.
2. Whenever another party-line subscriber requests the use of the line for an emergency, courtesy should be prompt the first user temporarily to give up the use of the line.
3. Whenever a party-line subscriber takes the receiver from the hook and finds the line in use, the receiver should be replaced at once in a careful manner.
4. At the end of a conversation the receiver should be replaced upon the hook immediately, otherwise the other subscriber cannot signal the central office.
5. Be sure always to give the operator the letters W or J in calling a party-line subscriber.

Co-operation is required to ensure good service of any kind.

WESTERNERS LEAVE TO PREPARE REPLY

BUFFALO, March 3.—Western delegations favoring the project of a ship canal through the St. Lawrence route to the ocean, returned home yesterday to prepare answers to arguments advanced by eastern interests which claim that the route would be of doubtful value for shipping, and costly far beyond any return that it would bring to Canada or the United States. Neither grain nor iron ore which form the bulk of Great Lakes tonnage, could be carried profitably to tidewater. Opposition speakers declared: It was also maintained that the millions of dollars required for the new waterway would be only the initial outlay. Shallow harbors and levee channels would offer the next expensive problem, it was claimed.

CONFERENCE ADJOURNED

Sittings Will Be Held in Toronto and Other Cities.
BUFFALO, N.Y., March 3.—After a round table conference of delegates and commissioners, the International Joint Commission adjourned yesterday afternoon. No further meetings will be held till after the regular meeting of the commission at Washington on April 5th. Both the American and Canadian delegates have fixed a list of cities for sittings with the commission which will decide Canadian cities fixed by Major A. C. Lewis are: Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Brantford, Windsor, North Bay, Sault Ste Marie, Port Arthur, Winnipeg and Calgary.

"It is very likely that the meetings will alternate back and forward across the border," said Major Lewis. "The chances are that they will begin in the West and proceed east. The whole sentiment of the congress set in heavily yesterday against Buffalo and New York State in favor of the great ship canal and a sea route from the Great Lakes.

LINER LOSES SIX OF CREW

Coasting Steamer Reaches Halifax With Survivors.
HALIFAX, March 3.—Six men, all natives of Liverpool, England, were lost when the Leyland liner Bohemian was abandoned off Halifax early yesterday morning. This was definitely established when the coasting steamer Scotsburn arrived at three o'clock yesterday afternoon with the remainder of the rescued crew.

MAKE PROTEST TO OTTAWA

Toronto Delegation Objects to Military Hospital on College Site.
OTTAWA, March 3.—A delegation from Toronto waited on Sir George Foster and members of the Government yesterday to protest against the proposed military barracks on the site of St. Andrew's College. The delegation represented residents in the neighborhood of the college. Consideration was promised by the Government.



CASTORIA

To Test Building Materials for the Various Municipalities is Considered Matter of Economy

The need for one or more central provincial testing bureau for building materials, where the different municipalities might apply for information regarding the quality of material before undertaking any large construction work or drafting a building bylaw, was emphasized by W. W. Pearce, business administrator of the Toronto Board of Education and formerly Toronto city architect, in a recent address on "The Modern Building Bylaw," delivered before the members of the Provincial Builders' Exchange. At the present time, Mr. Pearce pointed out, it was difficult to get first-hand information on Canadian building products and it was often necessary to go to Washington or other American cities for information on our own materials. As a result the bylaws founded with such information as their basis were often biased owing to the fact that the American when in doubt gave the Canadian the worst of the deal.

OTTAWA, March 3.—The first few days of the session have gone to show that the Government has nothing to fear from internal combustion. The cross benches are poorly tenanted, and for the greater part the various elements of the Government following appear to have flocked back together under the Cabinet wing just as chickens do at the approach of a hawk. Association together in the Chamber, the caucus room and the reading and lounging rooms during these past sessions, has gone far to dissipate differences of opinion. At the present time the attitude of Hon. T. A. Crerar appears to be "wait and see."

Says War Fought Cut Up

Complaint of Settlers Was Discouraged

Government

KAPUSKASING, March 5.—I have come here determined to get to the bottom of the problem. We determined to find out what complaints which you may have. None of us is prejudiced. In answer to the question whether our strongest sympathies are with you. Only your help in co-operation can make this a success.

With this very brief announcement from Mr. W. F. Nickle, M.P., Chairman of the Commission appointed by the Provincial Government to investigate the complaints and characterize the soldier settlers at the Kapuskasing colony, Mr. Nickle and his colleagues, Lieut.-Col. John I. Mackenzie and Prof. Sharp, opened their inquiry yesterday morning in the Chamber of Commerce.

In answer to the question whether the chairman Nickle put to each witness, these settlers replied that they wished to leave the colony if they claimed that their experience had been that the colony was not a success. They stated that the possibilities were not what officials presented them to be, and that "it had been a case of broken promises."

The case of each settler who testified yesterday is now one of all.

Thieves Attack Man Who Barred Way From Store

NIAGARA FALLS, March 5.—While endeavoring to prevent the theft of three women's dresses from the department store on Main street here he is treasurer, Peter F. Jensen, member of the board of education, was brutally beaten by two men who intercepted with the goods. Department heads went to Jensen but the strangers escaped.
