The point involved is of more than ordinary importance. Judge Steadman or any other judge on a recount does not act in a judicial capacity, any more than do the deputy returning officers who hold the polls. The fact that he happens to be a judge does not make all his acts judicial and there would be just about as much propriety in the court interfering by prohibition to prevent his transacting his personal business as in seeking to prevent his recounting the ballots at an election. At least this is the view that obtains in the two provinces above named and it seems fully warranted by the statute. It is desirable that such a rule should prevail: because the actual business of holding an election ought to be free from any interference from the judicial authorties. The House of Commons in England has for centuries guarded its privileges in this particular most religously. There is a principle underlying it all. The courts represent the crown directly. The proceedings, are as the law books have it, "before the Queen herself now here." The House of Commons represents the people, and the people should be absolutely free from the interference of the crown in determining in what manner they shall choose their representatives. Hence the judge, who holds a recount ought to be regarded, as he in fact is, as an officer of the House of Commons, and any attempt to interfere with him is, in this view of the case, a breach of the high privileges of Parliament. Such is the aspect of the case, viewed from the standpoint of parlementary practice and constitutional law. No question of a superior or inferior jurisballots is simply a ministerial duty assigned to the judge of the county court for convenience. He simply checks the work of the returning officers. He makes no order, pronounces no judgment and in disdischarging this duty ought to be as free from interference for the part of the Supreme Court as the returning officer himself. 
