London advices say that the Grand Trunk Railway's accounts for the half-year ending Dec 31st, last show a deficit of £174,400.

Lord Rosebery's Government had a debate last Monday evening on a vote to close the address. The vote was 279 to 271.

The market was fairly well attended yesterday, with the supply and demand about equal. Hay sold at 28-32c; oats 35c; pork 5 to 6c and potatoes at 22-25c. Other prices were unchanged.

At the Liberal-Conservative Convention held at Summerside on yesterday Mr. Richard Hunt was unanimously chosen as the candidate for the House of Commons for East Prince, at the next Dominion election.

In the British House of Commons Sydney Balfour, Parliamentary Secretary for the colonies, said the Government had under consideration the question of appointing colonial judges of the judicial committee of the privy council.

OTTAWA advices of yesterday say: There is little news in the political situation. Hon. Messrs. Rowell and Foster had an interview with the Governor-General yesterday, presumably for the purpose of carrying out the situation. Public opinion is still divided as to the course the Government will take.
