

WEST HURON REFORMERS.

They meet in Convention, discuss Public Issues, and Thoroughly Organize.

The West Huron Reform Convention was held at Duncannon on Wednesday, in Martin's hall, and was largely attended, there being a good representation from every polling sub-division. In the absence of the President of the association, Wm. Young, Reeve of Colborne, township, was called to the chair.

The secretary, Mr. Robt. Harrison, of Ashfield, explained the object of the meeting, which had been called for the purpose of thoroughly organizing the Reform party, and for the careful consideration and revising of the voters' lists.

The following executive officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Robert Harrison, Duncannon; secretary, Robert Harrison, Belfast.

No 1 polling sub-division—Thos. Disher, Duncannon; 2nd vice-president, Chas. Seager, Gaderich; treasurer, J. F. Andrew, Ashfield; secretary, Robert Harrison, Ashfield.

The work of township organization was then proceeded with, and good working committees were appointed for every polling sub-division in the riding, as follows:—

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to meet so many of his constituents and a representative body of men on this occasion. Some two years had elapsed since the time when he last appeared at a convention in Duncannon, and on that occasion the organization had been so perfected that they had no need of a convention, and the two elections that followed. It was to be hoped that this convention would be equally fruitful of good results. One of the delegates present to-day had mentioned the fact that no member of parliament had been present at the temperance convention held yesterday, Clinton. In reply he would state that upon one thing the temperance people could depend, and that was that the Reform members of the Local House were almost a unit in favor of the temperance cause. One of the hardest things the Mowat Government had to do in the last election was the bitter spirit which had been engendered against it by the liquor interest, urged on by the leaders of Tory sentiment. The Crooks' Act had proved a beneficial law for the furtherance of temperance, and the aim of the Local Government had been, and would continue to be, to promote the improved working of temperance legislation. To-day a good deal of time had been taken up in the work of organization, but he looked upon that as being time well spent, for the work was not done, and elections were carried by organization. In the last Dominion election held in West Huron the loss of one vote in each of the polling sub-divisions would have caused the defeat of Mr. Cameron who now so ably represented the county, and the election of his opponent. Four or five votes neglected in each polling sub-division would have reduced his own majority to 167 to a minority. A large number of members in the Local House had majorities under 50, and a very small change would have sufficed to render them minorities. Hence the necessity for thorough organization. He then went on to discuss the improper manner in which the Conservative leaders and their hired press had endeavored to make a dead set upon Ontario, and in scathing terms showed up the tactics of the Mail, the actions of Sir John and his colleagues, and the futile efforts of the men now on trial before the courts in connection with the conspiracy case. Sir John, as a constitutional lawyer, was next taken up and criticized, and his fallibility on the subject of the liquor question, and the streams bill proved. He then referred to the staunch manner in which they had stood by him in previous elections, and stated that the loyalty of his friends to him had been one of the principal reasons that had induced him to sacrifice his personal feelings, and emerge from the position of a private member when the treasurer-ship of Ontario had been offered him by Hon. Mr. Mowat. He urged them to continue to be loyal to Liberal interests and to the rights of Ontario, and to be true to themselves and their country, and closed a brilliant address of over an hour's duration amidst loud and prolonged applause.

Dr. Sloan, of Blyth, was the next speaker, and in opening paid a high tribute to the sterling abilities and political worth of Hon. A. M. Ross. The Liberal party had done much for Ontario, although the work had been militated against to a great extent by the actions of Sir John and his colleagues. Sir John had said he could veto any act passed by the Legislature, and if this were so, Ontario certainly was not a gainer by confederation. But it had been proven in three instances before the Privy Council that Sir John's opinion on constitutional matters was of no value, and it was probable that before long he would learn that the rights of our Province were not to be tampered with with impunity. The speaker then referred in fitting terms to the ability and political powers of M. C. Cameron, and named him as a coming man in the Liberal Cabinet that would ere long be formed under the able leadership of Hon. Edward Blake. After denouncing the iniquities of the Dominion Government, and pointing out a number of the most glaring, he referred to the necessity for calling such meetings as the present, and advocate the holding of five or six political gatherings in each constituency every year. By this means the members would be enabled to give an account of their stewardship, and a more general knowledge of Liberal politics would be vouchsafed to the community at large. M. C. Cameron, M.P., on coming forward was greeted with a tumult of applause. He said that owing to the lateness of the hour it would be impossible for him to give even a brief outline of the frauds and rascalities that had been perpetrated by the Dominion Government during its last session.
