Mob Burns Negro.

Philadelphia, Aug. 14.—Thirty miles west of here, in the town of Coates, Vilez Walker, a desperado negro, was carried on a cot from the hospital last night and burned to a crisp by a frantic mob of men and boys on a fire which they ignited about a half mile from town. The negro, who had shot and instantly killed Edgar Rice, a special policeman of the iron mills, was dragged to the scene of the shooting, bleeding vitally for mercy. He had been arrested by a posse, shooting himself as he was being taken. The crowd, containing as many women as men, broke through the police guard at the hospital later in the evening and found Walker strapped to a cot. The mob seeing this gathered up the bed and placing it on the shoulders of four men started for the country. They stopped at a farm and quickly gathering up a pile of dry grass placed the bed containing their victim upon it and set it on fire.

Two Jokers Are Shot to Death.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 12.—Frank J. Cook, aged 35, and Daniel Vreeland, aged 30, special detectives for the Lake Shore Railroad, were shot and instantly killed last night by patrol officer Wm. Burnett, aged 38, of the Michigan Central Railroad, on the Michigan Central tracks near Junction Avenue. They met death as the result of a joke that they attempted to play on Burnett. They were all on the best of terms and met at the junction of the two roads every night. Last night Cook and Vreeland, knowing that Burnett had had trouble with two car breakers, decided that they would hide behind a car and spring out on him as he passed. Burnett, not recognizing either of the men in the darkness, drew his gun and shot four times at them, three bullets taking effect. One went through Cook's heart, the other two striking Vreeland in the head and chest. Burnett then ran down the tracks to Junction Avenue where he met a patrolman Dan O'Connor, who was hastening towards the scene of the shooting. "I've just shot a couple of our thieves," he said. The two men went back and looked at the bodies. When Burnett saw who the men were that he had shot he broke down. O'Connor took him to the station where he was locked up.

Plenty of Stockfish.

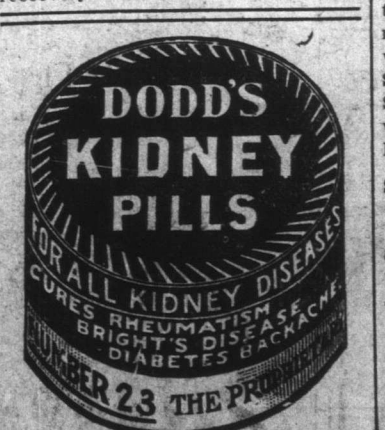
The catch of stockfish along the Norway coast ended a couple of weeks ago. The final report of the total catch of stockfish in Norway is at hand. It refers to round fish only. The total catch this season was 64,000,000 fish against 55,700,000 in 1910 and 56,500,000 in 1909. In spite of there having been prepared for around 25.2 million this season against 2.09 million last season, we do not believe prices for stockfish will be any lower this season than last because last year there was a lot of old fish unsold at the beginning of the season while this year there is no old stock, besides the fish this season is smaller but the quantity this season will be exceptionally fine. Strohmeyer & Arpe Co.'s market report says—

The quantity caught of round fish exceeds by a few million the quantity of fish caught last season. Nevertheless, it is hard to say whether prices will open up any lower than they did last season. The fish itself appears to be somewhat smaller individually than it was last year. No records are kept of the catch of split fish, so everything we may say in regard to the quantities caught, will be mere guesswork, based on rather unreliable information. Opening prices seem to be about the same as last season for split fish.—Fishing Gazette Aug. 5.

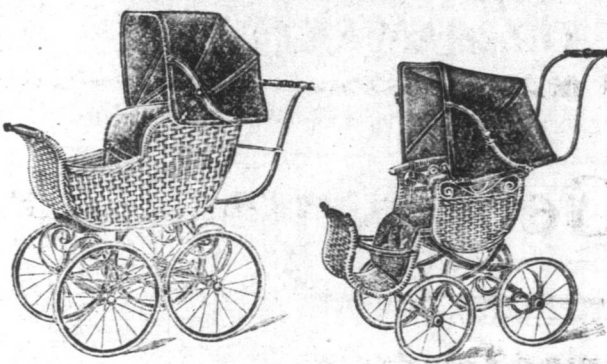
