Servia has not received any proposal from Austria, but assuming that she has no territorial designs Servia is quite willing to favour economic and commercial expansion of Austria. Storm May Break at Any Moment.

LONDON, Nov. 7. The Constantinople correspondent of the Morning Chronicle says: At any moment the storm may break and involve us in red ruins of massacre and outrage. Soon Constantinople will be surrounded by all the discordant elements. Its population, Turks, Armenian, Greek, Kurd and a heterogereus mass of Europeans will be crushed together into seething congeries of panic-striken humanity. All old hatreds will blaze into scorching flames. For five hundred years the Turk has lorded it over the infidel and the last hour of ascendancy, it is feard, may be dyed in blood. had a foretaste of what is to com in the news from Rodosto. Thither came bands of Nizam Pasha's Army driven from Lule Burgas by the vic-torious Bulgarians. The thin veneel of European civilization vanished ike mist in the morning sunlight. A ene of horror followed. The town was given up to massacre, outrage and pillage. It was set on fire in seven places, and children were hurled into the raging flames. In their agony and fear many tried to get to the open sea in boats, anywhere from these human wolves. In some cases the boatmen massacred them, whils in others those who trusted them found a merciful death beneath the waves The victorious march of the Bulgar

ian Army results in similar scene wherever the Turks anticipate their coming. To show how easily disaste might arrive, an incident occurred last night near Galata Bridge. A Greek, in a sailboat, was congratulating his companions on the Bulgarian victorites. Suddenly a caique slid alongside. The Turk swung himself aboard the Greek boat, a knife gleamed and the Greek fell overboard dead. Then revolvers cracked, and the Turk and his companion fell, nediately there was firing in all dir ctions. Six Greeks and Turks were killed or wounded before the police oat arrived and quelled the disturb ance. I believe that foreigners are re safe, but no government measures will suffice to protect the Christian Ottomans, in the event of break of rioting.

Britannic, and reported having certain dutiable goods on board. The said ship was thence dispatched to Baie Verte, to unload part of her cargo, and return back to Tilt Cove, to load ore for Swansea, and since the Cape Copper Company has decided to prospect Baie Verte is fast becoming a hive of industry, having a track laid from the wharf in to the mine, a distance of two and a half miles, with an engine attached to haul the ore out to the pier.
