Cable News.

SHOREHAM, Feb. 13. The entire crew of eight seamen of the steamer "My Own," were drowned to-day, when the vessel was wrecked while entering the harbor. The Captain was saved. She was a coasting vessel of 300 tons.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13. Predictions of the fiercest revolution the World has known, if the British Government approves the Hindu exclusion policies of its Colonies, were made to-day before the Commons Immigration Committee by D. Boz, Professor in the University of Iowa, during an argument in which he contended that Hindus were entitled to naturalization here.

LONDON, Feb. 13. Sharp action was taken to-day by the police in connection with the British Army cantonment, when warrants were issued for the arrest of James Ness, formerly manager of Linton, Limited, and Archibald Minto, also of Linton's, neither of whom appeared in answer to summonses sent them when the case opened. Ness is believed to be in Canada, and Minto in France.

CAFTOWN, Feb. 13. General Botha declared to-day that the Government had been faced with revolution, during the recent general strike. But for the Government's action, he said in the Union Parliament the country would have been plunged into a reign of anarchy and murder. European agitators, were exhorting natives to rise in support of the strike. The generals who were at the head of the movement, sat, he said, on the benches of that parliament.

NEW YORK, Feb. 13. The formal entry of the Rodmer-Wanamaker aeroplane for the first trans-Atlantic flight was prepared to-day, and will be mailed at once. An other aviator, who says he will fly to the prize, is Raygorodsky, who holds a pilot's certificate from the Aero Club of France. After making a study of weather maps of the North Atlantic Ocean for the last ten years, the Water Flying Committee of the Aero Club of America, has decided to recommend September as the best month for the attempt. June is regarded as bad month for the flight at St. John's. The proposed starting point, because about two-thirds of the month is said to be foggy, the fogs extending out from the Grand Banks, for a distance one-fourth of the way across the Atlantic.

LONDON, Feb. 13. King George to-day told Wilco Carille, head of the Church Army, that he was a great believer in hard work. "I have hard work myself," he said, "and think it is good for the people." His Majesty's remark was made during an audience granted Mr. Carille at Buckingham Palace. The King expressed strong disapproval of indiscriminate charity, saying he considered voluntary agencies, such as the Church Army, far better able to help the sick and unfortunate back to good citizenship. As Mr. Carille was entering the Palace, he was accosted by a former pickpocket, who had been reclaimed by the Church Army, who sent a message to the King saying he had lived honestly since the day of King Edward's coronation, when he had stolen 32 watches and purses. He had now, he said, £600 in the Savings Bank.

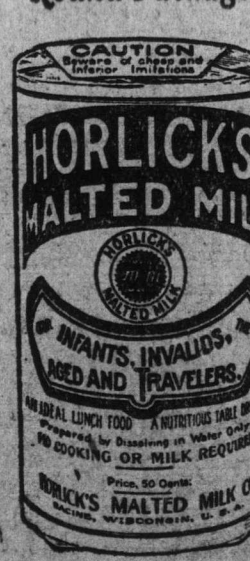
