Belgian Ruler Upholds Cardinal Mer-

cier in Stand He has Taken.

Washington, Jan. 28.—The Belgian

legation here gave out to-day a copy

of the telegram sent by King Albert of

Belgium to Pope Benedict, upholding

Cardinal Mercier. It was as follows:

"The heart of your holiness must

have been deeply afflicted by the ar-

rest of a high dignitary of the church,

a member of the sacred college, who,

though paying respect to the situation

de facto of the occupier of his country,

could not remain silent in the pres-

ence of the merciless wrongs com-

mitted toward his parishioners, and the

ill-treatment inflicted on so many

priests in my country.

"I express to the venerable head of

the Roman Church, my great admi-

ration for the conduct of Cardinal Mer-

cier, who, like the glorious prelate

of the olden times, has dared to op-

pose perjury with truth, and to pro-

claim the indisputable right of the

cause of justice. In the face of the

universal conscience, I beg your hol-

iness to believe in my respectful feel-

ing, and my filial devotion.—Signed

ALBERT."

vice abroad.
