Cable News.**OUT OF RANGE OF "MARIA."**

PARIS, May 30. The removal of children from Paris was begun this morning when 1,000 children from the Montre Mart district of the city were placed aboard a special train bound for an evacuation colony in the dept. of Allier, in central France. This is the first action taken under a plan for removing Paris children from the possibility of harm from a long range gunshell striking a school filled with pupils, as a church where worship was in progress, was struck on Good Friday last.

RAIDER DOWNED.

PARIS, May 30. An enemy airplane was brought down by French anti-air craft guns during an attempted raid on Paris last night. None of the German machines were able to fly over the city. A few bombs were dropped in the suburbs.

IMPORTANT RESOLUTION.

LONDON, May 30. (Via Reuters Ottawa Agency.)—The Colonial Institute, at its annual meeting, passed a resolution on motion of Lord Brassey, urging separation of control of Imperial matters from the domestic affairs of the Motherland, and that the settlement of the future constitution of the United Kingdom is an essential preliminary to the discussion of the future government of the Empire at the special Imperial Conference to be summoned after the war.

OFFENSIVE INCREASINGLY FORTHRIGHT.

LONDON, May 30. The Times refers to the enemy's offensive as increasingly forthright, and after discussing the seriousness of the menace, it points to the fact that the French are meeting the enemy's blows. They recall, says the newspaper, that they have lived through far darker days, and in the end have invariably defeated the invaders. The loss of Soissons was announced at too late an hour to develop much comment in the morning papers. The loss in itself, says the Times, is not of military importance, but the enemy is now on the high road which passes through Villers Cotterets, about 45 miles from Paris. On the other hand, in an article written

made a very wide detour before heading again for this port. Sir Leslie Proby, one of the passengers, formerly British Governor-General for Barbados, who is on his way to take the new post of Governor-General of Jamaica, said that before leaving Barbados he had heard that a German submarine had been sighted on May 16th near Bermuda. One report to this effect was made by an American ship, and another by a British vessel, he said.

STOPS ENEMY PROGRESS.

PARIS, May 30. We have prevented the enemy's progress in the western outskirts of Soissons, says the official report from French headquarters to-night. To the south we solidly hold the left bank of the Oise River. The Germans are multiplying their efforts in the direction of Ville-en-Tardenois. The battle continued to-day with unabated fury along the whole front. On our right and to the northwest of Rheims we are holding our positions. The enemy air forces which have been attacking with the greatest daring by French airmen, who destroyed 19 German machines, brought down two balloons and compelled 23 enemy airplanes to land in a damaged condition.

SHELLING BEHIND THE LINES.

LONDON, May 30. The Mail's correspondent at British headquarters in France says that the shelling of towns behind the lines, some of them very fine, has been becoming more intense. Amiens, added the correspondent, has been bombarded heavily in the past 24 hours, coinciding with the increased activity of the enemy air raiders.

TRAMPLED TO DEATH.

GENEVA, May 30. Eighteen women and children were trampled to death and a number of persons injured in a panic, which followed an aerial alarm sounded at noon in Mannheim yesterday.

SUBSCRIBING TO NEWFOUNDLAND LOAN.

MONTREAL, May 30. The announcement was made to-day that a syndicate of Canadian bond houses had purchased an issue of \$3,000,000, 10 year 6 1/2 per cent. bonds of the Government of Newfoundland, and that these would be offered to Canadian investors at par and interest.

McCuish who is directing the operations told the Western Star a few days ago that the product of the seam was coal of the best quality. They have two other seams of about four inches, and have traced the coal in the main seam over two hundred feet and are still following it, and should conditions warrant it a shaft will be put in.
