"The hardest thing in writing," says the Authorman, "is not to know what to leave out." Of course the Authorman is not particularly original in this statement. It has often been said before in one form or another. I remember, recently reading a column headed "What to Leave Out," when the Authorman said that, "the most difficult part of writing is to know what to leave out."

When the Authorman said that, he was not of a similar fact (no originality); namely, that one of the hardest things in the fine art of writing is knowing what not to say and what to do.

Many people who are fairly good writers at the positive side of living know when it comes to the negative side, they are at a loss.

They don't know where to stop. In other words, they lack the quality of restraint.

They are conscious of knowing that people in whom this lack is the most makes the whole instrument of writing.

People who would be interesting if they were to yield the floor to someone else and what to leave out, they only achieve the distinction of being considered bores by their incoherent outpourings.

They Become Officious.

Super-Bombs For Berlin.

Powerful Weapons for Our Airmen. So powerful are our new explosives that the aeroplane pilot is expected to release them at 8,000 feet elevation.

The effect is stupendous. The first was dropped on an enemy aerodrome around which was planted a veritable frieze of "archies" and searchlights. At the explosion every gun was silenced, the whirling bars of light were cut off, and the pilot groping home in darkness pondered whether his new weapon were as effective as the last poison-gas which the sergeant said not only killed the soldiers, but got in the paybooks and wiped out the next of kin!

The new bombs are very heavy, and dropping from immense heights may be exploded far above the earth, sprinkling the shrapnel and fragments over many acres of enemy territory. One recalls the big shell of the Queen Elizabeth which at Gallipoli was burst over a Turkish brigade in waiting, and the 2,500 fragments practically wiped them out as a fighting force.

Equal results are expected from the new bombs over enemy concentrations and cities. The long curves of our Independent Air Force mean in fact that enemy aerial resistance west of the Rhine is almost at an end, and during the long winter night Berlin is likely to hear at first hand the bombs of our aviators.

The secret of these new "terrors" has been well kept. While allowing the Germans to boast of their scientific prodigies, our chemists and armours have been at work, with the result that heavier charges, more efficient "bursts" and a greater certainty of fire than ever has been obtained.

The German lead has again been outdistanced, and in their raids on and over our lines very out-of-date bombs are being used. Even our smoke-bomb is as yet a puzzle to their scientists, and a great protection to attacking infantry and artillery.
