### DRIFTING.

The policy of drift carried on by the Government seems to be more accentuated as day succeeds day, and nothing is accomplished. The number of bills to which royal assent was given on Tuesday contained but few of any real advantage, the principal pair being the short-est, viz., the abrogation of the War Measures Act and the repeal of the Salt Codfish Exportation Act. It is now over three months since the Legislature opened, but so incapable have been the Government that the whole time has been practically wasted in so far as constructive legislation has been passed; the only marked feature being the industry of the Opposition members in closely querying the administrative officials on matters which the latter were endeavoring to conceal. Many affairs of state have been made public, which otherwise would have never been known, by the insistence of the members sitting on the right of the chair. So far as the railway policy of the future has gone, it has but resolved itself into a motion for a commission of operation to be appointed, meaning that the conduct of Newfoundland's transportation affairs will be handed about as last year, and with commensurate length of the country. And yet it was not so very long ago that the Prime Minister gave notice of a motion to suspend the rules of the House, a motion which, however, was very promptly and properly blocked by the leader of the Opposition. Isn't it time now that the Government did something to prove that they possess some ability. In years past the Hon. W. F. Coaker was ever protesting the length of the sessions and the unnecessary keeping of outport members in town. Not a word of protest is heard now, and the spasmodical efforts of the Government are well illustrated by long adjournments and then one night session, followed by only afternoon sittings. Only the goad of the Opposition produced what little has been accomplished. Taxing and expenditure is pursued with a perseverance worthy a better cause, and the people groan under the burden, while the passivity of the rank and file of the Government becomes more glaring daily. Get a move on, gentlemen!

### More Care Needed.

A motorist driving a large car rushed in Monkstown Road at 12.15 yesterday at a very dangerous speed. As a number of streets run into the one named above, children and in fact adults are in danger while such furious driving is practised. Citizens should take the numbers of such fast driven cars and be prepared to prove their charge and in this way furious driving will be somewhat lessened. It is a strange thing that cars are always going slowly when any accident happens. Our informant tells us the motorist referred to above increased his speed considerably after passing the police officer at Rawlin's Cross.

### Deserving of Thanks.

The Inspector General of Police is deserving of the thanks of the public for placing a constable on duty at the junction of Monkstown and Circular Roads. By his presence of mind on his first night of duty, this constable averted a collision between motor cars proceeding out of Circular and Carpsan Roads on to Monkstown Road. It is a pity that he was not on duty at 12 a.m. Tuesday when three young men who had indulged too freely in the cup that cheers, and were using language which was obscene in the extreme, passed along that way.

### More Inconsistency.

**THE GOVERNMENT AND WOMAN SUFFRAGE.**  
The Government's action in connection with the Woman Suffrage Bill is only another vivid example of that inconsistency for which the present Prime Minister and his party have been noted. By a promise to introduce the Bill as a Government measure, the Prime Minister disarmed the suffrage committee, who, satisfied to take his word, ceased their activities. And how have they been repaid? The Prime Minister now announces that the measure is a non-partisan one, and when Mr. Fox hinted that he might propose an amendment which would entitle women not only to vote, but to sit in the Assembly, he at once seized upon this as a means whereby he might throw out the Bill entirely. Things of this sort when done by the present Government are not surprising, but it was certainly most unexpected as it was most unfair and discourteous on the Prime Minister's part, to treat the women of Newfoundland in such a cavalier manner.

### League Football.

**C.L.B. WIN THEIR FIRST GAME.**  
Before a fair gathering of spectators, the C.L.B. Old Comrades won their first League football game last evening by defeating the Highlanders, 2 goals to 0. The game was not by any means a good one as there was a complete absence of any attempts to play together on the part of both teams, whilst a great deal of wild kicking was indulged in. Several fine scoring opportunities were missed by players of both teams throughout the game, through their feeble attempts at shooting and it was not until 15 minutes of the second half had elapsed that the first goal was scored. Fever doing the needful. Before the game ended Skelington obtained the second and last goal for the C.L.B. The next game will be played to-morrow evening, the Cadets and Saints being the contestants.

### Yesterday's Garden Party.

The annual Garden Party held by the people of St. Joseph's Parish, took place on St. Bonaventure's Campus yesterday afternoon and proved an attraction for a large number of people. The affair was an entire success and Rev. Fr. Pippy and his energetic Committee are to be congratulated on its outcome. The refreshment stalls, tea tables and side shows did a good business. The sports programme proved most interesting, the five mile race being an exciting event. There were 4 contestants, Jacobs, Redmond, O'Toole and Dunphy. At the start Jacobs took the lead and held it till the first mile was passed, when young O'Toole, a boy of 17 years, gradually gained and setting a splendid pace gave an excellent exhibition, finishing the course in 30 minutes 21 seconds with Redmond second. In the football five the medals were awarded the Britons' team, who beat the Fidiains in the finals. By kind permission of the Officer Commanding the C. L. B. Gymnastic Squad in charge of C.S.M. Randall gave an exhibition of pyramids which added considerably to the evening's enjoyment. The C.C.C. Band was present during the evening and rendered a very pleasing programme of musical selections.

### Open Air Concert.

The C.C.C. Band held their first open air concert for the season in Bannerman Park last night. The Band which was under the direction of Capt. A. Bulley, gave a splendid performance, large crowds taking advantage of the fine night to wander through the park listening to the music. The concert will be repeated this evening in Victoria Park.

### Public Park for "Iron Isle."

Through the efforts of the Dominion Fire Brigade, a public Park has been obtained for Bell Island, and will be officially opened next week. The Park is splendidly located and will no doubt be greatly appreciated by all the residents of the "Iron Isle," who have been seeking something of this sort for some time.

### Valuable Horse Perished

A valuable horse owned by Mr. P. Bulger was seized with colic yesterday afternoon and perished after a short time. The animal had been on driving during the day, and on returning was fed and put in Rannles field to pasture. It was shortly after noticed to be suffering from colic, and although everything possible was done for it, the animal failed to recover. The loss is a heavy one to Mr. Bulger.

### Bell Island Derby Day.

The annual Bell Island Regatta will take place on Saturday next, July 9th. The sports, which are being held in connection with the regatta, will start at 2 p.m., being held in the Star field. At night a dance will be given in the Star Hall and it is safe to say that the 1921 Bell Island Derby Day will prove the best in the history of the Island's sports.

### Strike Continues.

The strike of the Longshoremen shows no sign of settlement as yet, although negotiations are being carried on. It is said that an offer embracing conditions that could not be accepted has been proposed by the Union. The only development of the situation today is that the Carment's Union, out of sympathy, have refused to handle any freight now being discharged. Nor will they break bulk in the stores. There are several cargoes of coal in port, which were being landed under contract, but which the Union would not permit being discharged while the strike is on. The cargo of S.S. Manoa is being discharged from the hatch by the crew, and the office hands from various mercantile premises. Some 10,200 barrels have been landed in record time, and the work will finish at 4 o'clock this evening when the ship will sail for Montreal.

### The Caplin School.

Since Monday last caplin have struck in at Middle Cove, Outer Cove and vicinity. Large quantities are being taken by farmers for use in compost heaps. During the week quite a lot of fish has been taken in this neighbourhood, the traps doing well, some getting as high as 20 to 30 quintals at a haul. Men fishing with trawls, however, are doing practically nothing.

Halibut has been fairly plentiful on that part of the coast.

### Brought in Prisoners.

Constable O'Flaherty of Ferryland arrived in town by this morning's train bringing a prisoner from Caplin Bay to serve a sentence in the Penitentiary. The man was convicted of larceny by Magistrate Freebairn, and was sentenced to six months' imprisonment. Constable O'Flaherty will return to Ferryland to-morrow.

### Fatal Accident.

**KNOCKED DOWN BY BICYCLE-AGED WOMAN DIES.**  
Whilst proceeding along Hamilton Street yesterday afternoon an aged woman named Hydes, who lived on Maple Street, off Freshwater Road, was knocked down by a bicycle ridden by a young man named Campbell and died a few hours later. The victim of the accident, who was 78 years of age, was picked up by Campbell, who had her driven in a motor car to the house of Dr. McNeven, where she was attended to by Dr. Roberts, who said she was dangerously ill. She died at an early hour this morning. An enquiry will be held into the accident later.

The woman in question was wheeling her child in a baby carriage, down Water Street, when her attention was suddenly attracted by a runaway horse drawing a cart and which was careering madly down the street in her direction. Two men and a woman were knocked down in the mad rush, and the frightened animal was almost on her, when with quick presence of mind, the woman snatched the child from its carriage. She was not a moment too soon, for the runaway, a fraction of a second later, came in contact with the baby carriage and smashed it to pieces. The mother received such a shock that she was forced to seek medical aid before returning home.

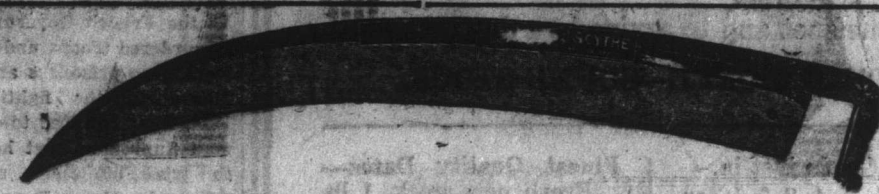
Schr. Acadia, coal laden from Sydney, sheltered at Trepansey this morning, on her way to Cape Race.
