ALL DEAD IDENTIFIED. The number of dead from the crash of the giant army dirigible Roma, at the Army Base here yesterday, remained to-day at thirty four, all identified. Eight of the eleven survivors were in hospital, one in a critical conwere in hospital, one in a critical condition. Army officers, who survived the disaster, declared it was caused by the collapse of an elevating rudder.

SANCTIONED OFFICIALLY. VANCOUVER, B.C., Feb. 22.
The article published yesterday Canadian newspapers, crediting officials of the Doukhobor Colony with the statement that Doukhobor children might be killed off, and the Colony scattered as a wandering tribe, was given out with the knowledge and sanction of Peter Veregin, Head of the Canadian Doukhobors. Veregin stated that it had his sanction, in reply to a wire from the Canadian press. The article said that the Doukhobors were taxed so heavily, that the Colony probably would find it impossible to support its children and infirm.
