Floating Whaleries.

PROPOSITION TURNED DOWN BY GOVERNMENT.

(Harbor Grates Standard.)

The proposition of a Norwegian Co. to start what is known as Floating Whale Refineries in this Colony has not been favorably received by the Government, and the application for the necessary rights and concessions has been turned down. The operation of a floating plant would give the company a free hand to catch whales anywhere and everywhere on our coasts, and would kill all stationary plants that may or will be operated in the near future thus killing individual enterprise, restrict local labor and give the wealth of the industry into the hands of outside capitalists. The rejection of the application by the Government is generally considered to be wise, especially so because of the fact that the whaling business will likely be resumed this season on the coasts by two or more companies, and will conduct the fishery from factories on the shore. Capt. Anonsen, who recently left here for Norway to complete his plans to go into the fishery on an extended scale, purposes, we are given to understand, operating factories at Aquaforte, Lark Harbor, probably Cape Broyle and Beaver Cove, and the Hon. D. A. Ryan, who carried on the business at Hawke's Harbor, Labrador, up to some three years ago, intends to re-start the industry next season. The whaling steamer Cachet that has been lying up in Trinity, will be used and the chances are that she will become an active one the coming summer. The prices of whale oil and by-products have improved lately, and are such now as to give those who are to take up the work every prospect of success. Monopolies in industries do not lead to the general good, and their granting by Governments is not sound policy.

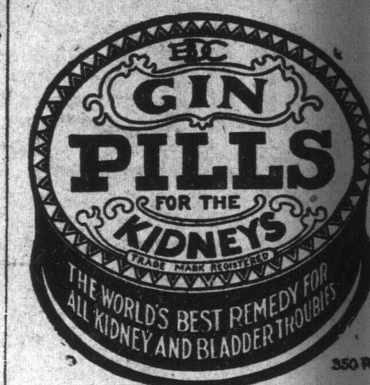
