The pitch of wickedness to which a man must have attained before he can deliberately take the life of a fellow-being is something that those not skilled in the deep mysteries of iniquity cannot pretend to understand. A premeditated murder is committed not once, but often. The horrible conception takes shape in the mind, the details are settled, and in fiendish fancy the deed is committed vor again long before its physical perpetration. It is this which renders murder, as the word is technically understood, peculiarly revolting, brands the murderer as the worst of his race, and consigns his body to the hangman. Between the man who, in a fever of passion, deals a death blow, and him who hunts down his victim as silently and relentlessly as a Thug, there is as much difference as between light and derkness. It is the inten. there is as much difference as between light and derkness. It is the intention, not the act, that gives shade and character to the crime.

Compared with some other coun tries, deliberate murder may be said to be of rare occurrence in Canada. The assassin here does not, for a few small coins, plunge his dagger in the heart of another man's enemy as he does in Italy and Spain, and it is because we are unfamiliarized with such crimes, and do not intend to be, that when murder is perpetrated we mark it with our strongest detestation, and take the heaviest vengeance on the

That the assassination of Mr. Mc Gee was worthy of a Thug-one of a race of professional murderers-cannot be denied. With a fierce determination Whelan followed him from one place to another, a pistol in his pocket and murder in his heart, and his step was never stayed nor his resolution shaken by one emotion of lenting pity. Even after the bloody deed was accomplished his mind seems to have been a stranger to these feelings of remorse, which in all but the most obdurate criminals, and sometimes in them, too, succeed the perpe tration of the highest crime on the calendar. Here, indeed, is the true type of a murderer. How often in sleeping visious, how often in waking fancy had he presented his pistol at the head of his unarmed victim, and sent the bullet on its fatal mission? How many are there, even among as sassins, who would not pause for a moment when baulked in a first attempt on the life of their vicum, as Whelan was when he visited Mr. Mc. Gee's house on New Year's night? Yet we do not find that he was in the least diverted from his purpose by the incident, or that any feeling of superstition, which often has appalling terrors for such men, had any effect upor

We speak positively of Whelan as the murderer, because he has been legally pronounced to be such, and the verdict, guilty, has not been rendered with precipitancy or partiality. The trial is the most remarkable in the annals of Canadian courts of justice, and the result accords with the popular feeling of the country. When Mr McGee lay dead in his gore at the door of his boarding house, there seemed but a slight probability that his murderer would ever be discovered, so quickly had he vanished, and so faint, for a time, were the traces of the direction he had taken. He thought no human eye had witnessed his crime, and that in his case there would be an exce, tion to the proverb, "murder will out." But there is and very little room for doubting the testimony of Lacroix. He may be a simple-minded Frenchman, but had he been a Dickens pourtraying an individual like Whelan he could not have mentioned an incident more in keeping with the character of his creation than the oath of the murderer when he struck himself against the post. This was far too fine an invention for such a person as Lacroix; it must have happened beneath his no Then there was the other very singular circumstance of Whelan's ac tions and looks being noted as he sat in the gallery by a stranger, who that night made an entry of his observa tions in his diary before he heard any thing of the murder. Then there were his fearful threats, expressed with curses, his conversation with Doyle the validity of which was not affected by the attempts of counsel to throw discredit on the witnesses, there was the pistol found in his possession. one barrel of which had been recently reloaded, and there were his ditties sun or recited in his cell, in which he expressed his joy at hearing of the death of the traitor D'Arcy McGee All these facts were given to the public shortly after the murder, and at that time, as well as when more re cently repeated at the trial, they pro duced a general conviction that Sullivan alias Whelan, who was said by
