A Letter to the Working Men.

DEAR SIR,—With your permission I de re to make an explanation in regard to a rumour that prevails to a certain, the propriety of united action in reducing our employees' wages. As I wish lair play and a hearing before being condemned, you will pardon me for giving the whole facts connected with the case. Your readers are fully aware that two months ago there was a complete evulsion in the mercantile prosperity of the United States. Strong houses and millionaires were failing by the dozen ploying thousands of employees, were sed without a me Hundreds of thousands of mechanics, who had hitherto earned a good wage were out of employment. This crisis had an effect on our Canadian trade, which or a period of over twelve months, had been marked by almost unparalleled strinency, so far as the money market was corned. Failures were occurring panks refusing discounts; collections be coming almost impossible, and the air

going to do.

A rumour had obtained currency that a certain sewing machine factory in Hamilton was going to discharge one hun a certain sewing machine factory in Hamilton was going to discharge one hundred employees; that others were curtailing, and reducing wages. The fact that were described by scores in quest of work, clearly proved that there were many machandes in the county, who would work for simost anything during winter rather than be idle. One attensive establishment in town had discharged a number, and re-arranged prices paid. Mr. Baymond had let a few employees go, and it was further reported that he had intended a reduction is wages.

Our company surveyed the whole prospects very carefully, and concluded that "a half loaf" was better than none for our men. We decided on running full time keeping our best men as far as possible, but during the winter season to reduce the wages in some instances from 10 to 15 per cent. The reduction was not a general one, as there are many employed, whose pay varies from \$3.90 peweek to \$2.50 per day. This reduction was to come into force on the 1st December, and each employee was notified accordingly.
