

Diabolical Attempt to Destroy Life.

An accident of a serious character occurred on the Grand Trunk Railway, about three miles west of Stratford, on Saturday morning last. The morning freight train was proceeding westwards, and on reaching the place in question was thrown off the track by two ties which had been placed on end in a cattle guard. The locomotive ran into the ditch on one side of the road and then upset. The engineer was the only person injured. Mr. Dunseith, whose farm is close to the scene of the accident, rescued him from the pile of broken timber and iron under which he lay partially buried. He had been scalded in the legs by the escape of steam; his other injuries were slight. Several of the cars were also thrown off the track and smashed to pieces. It is difficult to conjecture the motives which could have induced the perpetration of such a diabolical act. That it was done willfully there can be little doubt, but as yet there exists no clue which might justify the hope that the scoundrels might not escape unwhipped of justice. Had the accident happened to a passenger train, it is dreadful to think of the consequences. The authorities should offer a handsome reward for the apprehension of the offenders.—Stratford Examiner.
