Against the Jews.

Londor, Dec. 31.—A St. Petersburg correspondent states that the new law against the Jews to be promulgated with the opening of the new year forbids selling, leasing or mortgaging the Jew any estate within the empire; all privileges heretofore granted to certain Jewish merchants, as to the ownership of real estate, are canceled; Jewish artisans, who have been permitted to reside outside of the Hebrew pale, will have to return. The misery consequent upon this new decree can hardly be estimated. Christians aiding Jews to evade the regulations are to be punished.

The Skating Disaster.

London, Dec. 3i.—The skating disaster recently referred to occurred at Warwick-on-Avon. While several thousands skaters were disporting themselves on the river at that place the ice suddenly cracked in the middle of the river. An immense fissure opened, through which 500 of the skaters were plunged into the icy waters. The mere fortunate of the skaters lost no time in reaching the banks of the river. When the first shock was over a number of people hurried to the resoue of the drowning skater and a number of teem were pulled out; by many were drowned.
