Conveying Whey from Factories in Milk

Conveying Whey from Factories in Milk Cans Condemned.

At the messing of buyers and sellers of cheese in the City Hall, London, on Saturday, a commendable interest in the workings of factories and the maintenance of a high standard of merit for the productions of those factories was manifested.

How To DISPOSE OF WHEY.

President Geary before the close of the session stated that there was a disposition among those interested in cheese factories to alter the system of removing the whey from factories in the same cans in which milk is carried to the factories.

John Podmore, Ingersoll, said the Wesbern Ontario Dairymen's Association had done a great deal towards discouraging this system of conducting the business of factories, and Messrs. Geary and Ballantyne were entitled to special credit for also agitating for the removal of whey in some other way than in the milk cans. Patrons of factories should secure an additional can. The cheese is improved in flavor and the price is higher when whey and talk are never put into the same vessels. The finest cheese made is in factories where separate cans are used. Some patrons have threatened to withdraw their milk if it is made compulsory to use separate cans, but it would be better for Canada if some would withdraw and allow the standard of merit of Canadian cheese to be improved. There is a greater demand for cheese in the northern counties because separate cans are used. The keeping qualities of the cheese are better.

John Riesberry, Eright explained that his factory had always disposed of whey in separate cans. It was not distributed among the Patrons, as in some factories, but sold annually to the highest bidder. Last year it brought \$8 for every ton of cheese made, and this year it realizes \$4 65. The plan is appreciated by everybody concerned, and the highest price for cheese is always secured. The whey is drawn away

cerned, and the highest price for choses is always secured. The whey is drawn away from the factory in tanks.

Mr. Ballantyne said he had found that from the factory in tanks.

Mr. Ballantyne said he had found that factories that do not remove the whey in the milk cams always get better prices for their cheese. Bad flavors are the rule when the same cans are used. In the north the Elma and Bluevale factories are especially notable for excellent cheese. The whey is fed to hogs near the factory and Patrons get a profit on the pork. The plan of emptying the whey into a hugh tank at factories and having it carted away in milk cans is reprehensible, as the tanks are never made clean and sweet. There is always some sour whey in the tanks to mix with the sweet whey and tarnish the cans. Much of the whoy fed by farmers does not fatten stock, being soured before it reaches them. The grain, etc., fed produces much of the fat for which credit is given to whey.

Mr. Hodson referred to the Belleville and Brockville factories as producing finely-dayored cheese, because tanks are usually used to convey whey away, and the milk cans are seldom used for that purpose. The reputation of Western Ontario makers is retrograding because of their carelessing. R. R. Cranston, West Magdala, said that lest year some of the Patrons of his factory drew their own milk while the bulk of it came on routes. Those who drew their came on routes. Those who drew their own milk secured more than their share it when y and a new plan was now adopted. As cheesemaker he accepted \(\frac{1}{2}\) of a cent when it reaches the factory than it was last year. The trouble with gas has been almost entirely removed. The question of keeping whey and milk entirely separate is of such great importance to the dairy interests that the Legislature ought to pass a law defining the duties of Patrons and factories in the matter.
