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TRAGEDY IN DETROIT!

Premeditated Murder of a Young Drug Clerk.

Who Was Well Known in Windsor and Hamilton—Prominent Arrest of the Victim's Property Found in the Prisoner's Possession.

DETROIT, Nov. 20.—Fred H. Kelly, aged 20, clerk at James W. Caldwell's drug store, corner of Grand River and High streets, was found dead in the cellar of the store shortly after 7 o'clock yesterday morning with a bullet hole in the back of his head. When discovered he was dressed only in his trousers, night shirt and slippers, stretched out on the cellar floor, almost ten feet from the entrance. The pool of blood about Kelly's head giving proof of the terrible deed that had been committed. There were no evidences of any protracted struggle; his arms were folded across his breast and his legs were held apart. Dr. Wright found a bullet hole in the back of the head, just below the base of the brain. The body was cold and the doctor thought that Kelly had been dead several hours.

Kelly was alone in the store Friday night, but a number of persons talked to him shortly before he closed up and went to bed. One young man called on him a few minutes before 11 o'clock and chatted with him awhile. He was in a happy frame of mind, and when his friend was going he told him that he was going to bed immediately.

WHEN THE DEED WAS DONE. The murder was undoubtedly committed shortly after 5 o'clock yesterday morning, as Mrs. C. L. Sly, who lives over 246 Grand River avenue, heard some one pull the night bell at the drug store about that time. The meeting between the victim and the murderer must have been of short duration, as Patrolman Varron tried the door about 4:15 a.m. This left less than two hours for the completion of the tragedy.

As soon as the detectives arrived they began looking for some clue. Every thing in the store was in perfect order, and the safe had not been touched. ON THE TRAIL. Hayes was found at 26 Madison avenue, where he boards with his aunt, Mrs. Price. Hayes on being questioned as to his whereabouts on Friday night said that he attended Whitney's Opera House in company with Miss Hannah Hanfian, of 152 Pine street. From there he claimed that he returned to his young lady home, and he escorted her to her room, arriving there about 12:30 o'clock yesterday morning. He denied having been at Caldwell's store at any time since his discharge. He told his story in a very quiet self-possession manner, but his valise standing in the hallway made the detectives suspicious, and they decided to take Hayes to police headquarters for further examination.

DAMAGING CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE. The valise, a new one, was then opened, and Kelly's coat was found neatly folded and his other clothes. Hayes was asked whose coat it was, and he answered that it was his own. A search of the pockets also revealed Kelly's revolver. Hayes was placed under arrest, and a 32-caliber revolver was found in his hip pocket. It contained four cartridges, and looked as though it had recently been reloaded. He also had \$4.80 in change, mostly in nickels and dimes. To clinch matters a tailor in Windsor, who had made the coat, was shown the coat found in the valise. After looking at it for a moment he said: "That's Kelly's coat, for I made it for him." This cleared up the mystery, and Hayes was charged with the murder of Fred Kelly.

Hayes has a boyish appearance, being thin-faced and of a very slight build. He is about five feet six or seven inches high and weighs about 120 pounds. He exhibited no sign of breaking down when arrested.

NOW THE DEED WAS DONE. It is easy now to trace the movements of Hayes at the drug store. It is presumed that he wrote the prescription himself and signed a fictitious name to it. He aroused Kelly in the usual way, who let him in. After the prescription was filled he asked his intended victim for something he knew would be in the cellar.
