HELD THE SNAKE.

Exciting Incident in a Chicago Dime Museum—Panic Caused by the Breaking Out of a Fire.

Chicago, April 6.—A fire which bore a very threatening aspect for a time and created a panic broke out yesterday in a Clark street dime museum. It being Easter Sunday, the two small theaters in the building were entertaining audiences of more than the usual proportions at least 1,000 persons, who occupied every available space, being present. The audience at once made a rush for the doors, and for a time pandemonium reigned. The widest confusion, however, prevailed among the freaks and stage performers, many of the actors running into the streets in their stage attire. Probably the greatest excitement attending the fire was in the hands of a woman, a collection of huge snakes was on exhibition. Among this collection was a boa constrictor twenty feet in length. A female snake charmer had charge of the reptiles by the aid of all modern improvements, she attempted to place them in a box. Calling for assistance, a stranger climbed into the cage and offered to help capture the snake. The largest of the lot was one up by the neck, and no sooner had he done so than the snake, recognizing its captor, coiled itself around the man's arm. The snake charmer, realizing the man's danger, told him to keep a firm grip on the snake's neck. A terrific struggle then ensued, but by the combined efforts of the fair snake charmer and the obliging stranger, the boa constrictor was finally jammed into a big box and secured. The remainder of the snakes were easily rescued. The blaze was a hot one while it lasted, but the fire department soon extinguished it with only nominal damage. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Massacre of 8,000 Armenians at a Mission Station.

Friendly Arabs Defeat a Force of Dervishes.

Opening of the Olympic Games at Athens.

Catastrophe on a Welsh Mountain Railway Narrowly Averted—Emigration Statistics.

ARABS WHIPPED THEM. Sunakin, April 7.—The friendly Arabs have routed the Dervishes at Hoyet, killing twenty of them.

AN AWFUL DISASTER. Madrid, April 7.—Four thousand houses were destroyed and 30,000 people left homeless by the fire which devastated Manila, Philippine Islands.

SOCIALISTIC CONFERENCE. London, April 7.—The labor conference at Nottingham decided to invite all the Socialist bodies in Great Britain to confer together on the best means to bring about united political action on their parts.

EMIGRATION FIGURES. London, April 7.—By the official figures just published, it is learned that the number of emigrants from the United Kingdom to Canada during March was 1,608. The total for the three months ending March 31 was 2,841.

A PARNELLITE EJECTED. Dublin, April 6.—In the election today for a member of Parliament to succeed Dr. J. Edward Kenny, Parnellite, who recently resigned in the highest authority in Constantia, Ireland, Mr. J. L. Carey, Parnellite, was returned without opposition.

MERCILESS MASSACRE. London, April 7.—The Vienna correspondent of the Times says: "The Vatican publishes a letter from the superior of the Catholic mission station at Arfa, declaring that eight thousand Armenians have been massacred there."

BRITAIN AND SPAIN. A special cable dispatch to the New York World from London says: "The positive statement came to me tonight from a leading financier of the city (the England) has concluded an alliance with Spain, which will be the result of the national importance certainly warrants announcement of this fact. I give this statement with the reserve which its national importance certainly warrants pointing out only that the sensitive money interests of the city are often in the hands of the accountants' office, as any other part of the community, expect the highest official authority."

MISHAP ON A MOUNTAIN RAILWAY. London, April 7.—What might have proved a most serious accident occurred yesterday on the railway from Llanberis, at the foot of Mount Snowdon, when the locomotive, in the top of that mountain. The railway was inaugurated yesterday. The first train, the Great Western, was run, but when returning the engine jumped from the track at that part of the line on which the gradient was the steepest. The engine went over the precipice and was smashed to pieces, and it left the rails the coupling broke, and it was this alone that prevented a frightful accident. The engine and stoker jumped from the engine and escaped. The cars started down the grade at a tremendous speed, but they were arrested by the action of the brakes, which checked their speed, and finally brought them to a standstill. The passengers were uninjured, and the train was returned to the persons aboard the train for their heads, and without heeding the warnings given them, jumped from the cars. They were all severely injured. The second train that was descending the mountain crashed into the rear of the first train, and smashed a car into kindling wood. Just prior to the crash the occupants of the car had quit it.

THE GAMES AT ATHENS. London, April 7.—The opening of the Olympic games was observed at Athens yesterday as a national festival. The city was brilliantly decorated, and great enthusiasm was manifested over the sports. The day opened with a Te Deum in the cathedral, which was attended by the royal family. The trials today consist of 400 and one of 300 metres; also throwing the discus.

More than 40,000 persons were admitted to the stadium, including the King of Greece, the Duke of Sparta and other members of the royal family, the members of the diplomatic corps, and many other prominent persons.
