Best in the Land

Was Not Too Good for London's Old Boys,

Who Were Right Royally Welcomed and Entertained.

Citizens Turn Out En Masse to Honor Their Guests.

Enthusiastic Scenes at the Victoria Park Reception

And On the Arrival of the Trains From Toronto and Chicago.

Speeches of Welcome by the Mayor and Many Prominent Citizens.

Responses From Old Boys From Other Cities.

Gala Day at Springbank—Sports and Other Attractions—Nearly 20,000 Persons at the Riverside Park—Military Tattoo in Evening—That Gaietyland Parade.

It is doubtful if London was ever so gay as it was yesterday; the city was decked with flags and bunting, its streets resounded with music, its citizens were the personification of hospitality, and good fellowship. They had abdicated all their rights to control the city, and were content to allow the Old Boys, who had assumed with happy abandon the role of rulers, to have full sway. No welcome could exceed in sincerity, that received by the Old Boys who arrived yesterday morning. Immense crowds gathered upon the G. T. R. station, and upon the streets near by, to greet the Chicago contingent. Those of the Old Boys who had already arrived from Toronto, Detroit, Cleveland and other places joined with this crowd, and by their presence and

the music of their bands, helped in the reception of the newcomers. As soon as the visitors were ready they were marshaled by Mr. William Wanless in their places in the procession. The cities of Chicago and Detroit and Toronto were most largely represented. Considering the time of their organization, Ottawa, Cleveland, Hamilton, St. Thomas, Aylmer and Strathroy sent splendid contingents. From other places where associations have not yet been formed came Old Boys who were anxious to attend the reunion. On the Chicago train were many ex-Londoners from western cities, who journeyed to the western metropolis and joined its excursion. Old Boys were present from the States of Minnesota, Indiana, New York, Washington, and all the members of an association that was formed at St. Albans, Vermont, were here. The Chicago delegation, with a truly American disregard of expense, brought with them the splendid First Illinois Infantry Band. Wherever it went during the day, the fine appearance of its members, in their blue uniforms, heavily-branded coats, and white duck trousers, elicited admiring remarks. The members of the Light Guards Band that was brought by Detroit and Windsor could almost seem to be Old Boys themselves now. This is the third year they have helped in the success of the reunion, and Detroit would seem to be not itself unless they brought with them the Light Guards Band. The Toronto Old Boys were accompanied by the full band of the Royal Grenadiers. The 25th Regiment Band came with the St. Thomas Old Boys. The Seventh Band was very much in evidence. Each of these organizations seemed to vie with the others in producing the most inspiring music, and it would be hard to say which one succeeded best.

All the societies had some distinctive article to wear. The Chicagoans wore a massive medal, with the flags of Canada and the United States upon it. The medal hung from a bar that represented the Canadian beaver. All of the Old Boys from the Windy City wore a broad-rimmed felt hat. The badge of the Windsor and Detroit Old Boys was decidedly odd and attractive. It was composed of a small broad-rimmed gray hat, and a rabbit's foot hanging from a bar, upon which was inscribed the names of their associations. They carried Japanese parasols. The Clevelanders wore very beautiful badges and carried canes containing campaign Stars and Stripes. All the other associations wore distinctive badges.

TAKE NOTICE THAT THE FOLLOWING sections of Bylaw No. 761 must be complied with:

Section 20—The owners and occupiers of any lot or parcel of land within the city, opposite to which any tree is planted, shall cause the same to be kept trimmed at all times so that projecting limbs and boughs shall not be less than TEN FEET ABOVE THE SIDEWALK.

Section 21—It shall be the duty of the city engineer to see that the provisions of this bylaw relating to shade trees be carried out.

Any person convicted of a breach of this bylaw shall pay a penalty not exceeding \$50 for each offence, exclusive of costs, and in default of payment the same may be levied by distress or imprisonment in common jail, etc.
