LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Miss McArthur, of Aylmer, is visiting friends in the city.

—The annual commencement exercises of Holmuth College are now in progress.

—Mr. Ralph W. Peckham, representing Purvise Bill's Wild West show, is at the Griggs.

—Diphtheria cards have been put up on two Talbot street and Park avenue residences.

—Be sure and hear Harold Jarvis, the great tenor, on June 15. Particulars in amusement column.

—Rev. H. A. Thomas is at present in Brantford canvassing for the maintenance fund of Huron College.

—Mr. P. McPhillips, barrister, of London, is in town visiting old friends. He is on his way to New York. [Toronto World.]

—L. H. Ingram has gone to New York, from which place he sails for a purchasing trip for Smallman & Ingram in the European market.

—Bishop O'Connor will preach in St. Francis Church, Tilbury Center, next Sunday, and will hold confirmation services the same day.

—Col. Smith, D. A. G., has information that the London camp will be opened on June 19 instead of the 20th, as previously announced.

—Thomas Cahill was arrested last evening by P. C. Egleton, charged with being disorderly. He was fighting, it is asserted, on the street.

—Dr. F. P. Drake visited his parents in Kingsville last week. The sympathy of a large number in that community was extended to him on account of the sudden death of his wife.

—At a special meeting of the London West Council, held yesterday afternoon, the rate of taxation was fixed at 24 mills on the dollar. The assembly was held especially for this purpose.

—Wm. Jones of Dorchester, was arraigned before Judge Elliot yesterday, charged with the theft of three watches. Restitution was promised. He was discharged on suspended sentence.

—The bicycle record from St. Thomas to Aylmer, twelve miles, has been lowered by Mr. Wm. Devine, who accomplished the distance in 35 minutes. He rode a 24-pound Quadrant machine.

—The ADVERTISER picnic committee organized yesterday, with Mr. J. M. Symonds as president and Mr. C. H. Fawcett as secretary-treasurer. The annual outing will be held next month, probably at Sarnia.

—P. C. Austin Addison handed in his resignation at noon to-day and was relieved from serving further duty two hours later. Mr. Addison has been an efficient policeman, but the work did not agree with his health.

—A local organist says that a cow moos in a perfect fifth octave, or tenth; a dog barks in a fifth or fourth; a donkey brays in a perfect octave, and a horse neighs in a descent on the chromatic scale. Some human voices are hard to place.

—Engineer Robert Rutherford has been transferred to London. He has been promoted to an express train running east of London. On Monday he removed his household effects to the Forest City, where he will in future reside. [Sarnia Post.]

—A special meeting of the W. A. M. A. will be held in Cronyn Hall to-day at 4:30 p.m., when Mrs. Spindlow, of Fort River, will address the members. A large attendance is requested. A silver collection in aid of the general expenses of the society. S. Labatt, recording secretary.

—The case of Mary Bason against two trustees of the Horton Street Baptist Church—Shack Martin and W. T. Berry—was given a hearing in the Surrogate Court yesterday before Judge Elliot. The action is brought by the lady mentioned in an old colored gentleman named Carney. A previous bequest had remanded the church liberally. The second will was approved, and judgment given for the plaintiff.

—One of the drawbacks to the wearing of russet shoes is the fact that they so easily take on a rusty look. An easy scheme for keeping them clean and bright is given by the wise woman footgear tentacles to the value of his plan. He says: "With a piece of nice, ripe banana I can not only keep russet shoes clean, but I can keep them polished as well. I simply take a piece of banana and grease the leather with it, and then polish it with a cloth. In this way all the discolorations are removed and a polish is obtained."

—On Saturday evening the following young gentlemen of this city went to Fort Stanley and organized their camp for the season: Fred Henry, T. Hackett, E. Macneil, George Macbeth and Walter Smith. They have rented a cottage on Orchard Beach and will be known as the White Caps. Tents will be erected also near the cottage and everything be arranged to work for a comfortable season's pleasure. The boys will go down every Saturday evening. During the hot weather some of them will be there all the time.

—Osgoode Hall case: Re Hester Stafford. —J. F. Edgar, for the inspector of public charities, moved for an order for payment out of a fund in court of money due to the Crown for the maintenance of Hester Stafford in the London Lunatic Asylum.

Some of the officers have been working hard for weeks back filling up their companies and informing their men to be ready by June 20. The men in turn have been arranging affairs so as to get away on that date; but the new order, which all these arrangements are now being made for, is causing much inconvenience. Many of the men work in the C. P. R. shops and as pay day comes on the 19th they will be out this month's pay until July 19, if they go to camp on Monday. [Stratford Herald.]
