THE CORN DUTY REPEAL.

London Press Considers It Hurtful to Canada.

London, April 27.—Under the heading "A Check to Chamberlain," the Daily Mail strongly opposes the remission of the corn duty. It says: "It is our en- couragement to Canada in its efforts to establish a reciprocal preference. Corn is the most important Canadian staple import. If we can offer Canadians no preference on that, they have no quid pro quo to expect from us at all. We cannot be surprised if the colonies resent it, and if much of Chamberlain's good work in the Colonial Office suffers at the present time through wanton, not to say stupid, irritation of the colonies. It may be almost as great a folly as the clumsy titration with Germany."

VISIT OTTAWA
