The music is bright, but hardly as catchy as a comic opera should be. Mr. Edwards is evidently blessed-or cursed—with too good a musical memory, and snatches and phases of familiar melodies keep cropping out. The most effective numbers are "Lover's Lane," a bass solo; Song of the Sword," male solo and chorus, "The Cannibal Maid," 'The Lay of the Jay," sung by Miss Glaser, and the pretty "Dolly Varden" refrain, sung by Van Rennselaer Wheeler, and running through the score.

Miss Glaser, of course, carries off the large share of the honors, but several other numbers of the ten operating characters come in for a portion. Miss Estelle Wentworth, used her fine soprano voice to full effect as Lady Leithia.
