**THERE ARE NO DISSENTING VOICES
AMONG THE STRIKING COAL MINERS**

Local Unions Favor Continuation of Strike.

DO NOT FEAR ALL U. S. ARMY

Apathy of Business Men and Public in Strike Region—Rioting at Harrisburg.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 8.—At 11 a.m. today President Mitchell made the following statement to the Associated Press:

"Up to this hour at least 30 telegraphic reports have been received from local unions, giving the action taken by them last night and this morning. These reports are substantially as follows:

The mine workers resolved not to return to work until the demands as formulated at the Shamokin convention are granted or until the strike is called off by convention of the mine workers or President Mitchell, and if all the troops in the United States were brought here they could not force the men back to work. The reports are still coming in rapidly, and among them there is not one dissenting voice.

"The vote in all the locals so far heard from was unanimous. There are more than 300 locals, and all will have been heard from by tonight."

THE STRIKERS' MAIL.
The mail matter received at strike headquarters is increasing as the thermometer goes down. Probably the largest mail since the strike began was received today. Scores of letters are from eccentric persons giving advice as to what to do. Many more are received from persons who want the strike ended, so that they can get coal. One postal card reached headquarters from a man who was writing: "Please take the advice in third chapter, fourth verse, St. Luke's Gospel, and let us have some coal."

RIOTING AT HARRISBURG.
Harrisburg, Pa., Oct. 8.—At 11 a.m. last night an attempt was made to move 32 cars of coal from the siding of the Lykens Valley Coal Company. The coal was mined and run through the breaker last week by men who refused to join the strike. When the Sunday Branch Railroad Company attempted to move these cars, the coupling pins were drawn by strike sympathizers, and the engine was backed to the cars again. This occurred five times and some stones were thrown at the cars.

Finally the trainmen got the cars

THE FAST LINE ASSURED.
Hon. Hyndey Fisher Says Premier Will Bring News.

Montreal, Oct. 7.—Hon. Sydney Fisher, minister of agriculture, in an interview on the fast service said tonight: "Sir Wilfrid Laurier will no doubt have some interesting news for us when he returns, and I am inclined to think that something definite will be known before the morning. Personally I would like to see a line of ships built to steam sixteen or twenty knots, carrying 10,000 to 12,000 tons of freight, and accommodating about 250 passengers with comfort. It is easy enough to get a fast line, but it costs a lot of money, and I don't see why we should be bled by the nose for such a service. There is at present an inclination on the part of some Canadians to plunge into any expense, and this must not be allowed to go too far."

MISS ANTHONY A BRIDESMAID.

Veteran Woman Suffragist to Act in That Capacity at Secretary's Wedding.

Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 7.—The Anthony home on Madison street will be the scene of a wedding on Thursday for the first time in its history, and the bridesmaid will be none other than Susan B. Anthony, the veteran woman suffragist. The bride will be Miss Anna Dann, private secretary to Miss Anthony, for a number of years, and the groom Gilbert T. Mason, of this city.

Although Miss Anthony has tried to instill Miss Dann with her own views on woman's proper sphere, Cupid got the best of the argument, and, while plainly disgusted when she heard of the approaching event, regard for her secretary won her over, and she consented to have it take place at her home and to act as bridesmaid.

The ceremony will be performed by the Rev. Anna Shaw. The decorations will be black-eyed Susans and maidenhair ferns.

THE WAR GRATUITIES.
A militia order says: Non-commissioned officers and men of the Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Canadian Mounted Rifles and of the Tenth Field Hospital, lately returned from South Africa, are requested, if they have not already done so, to forward immediately to their station paymaster, colonial branch, Halifax, their certificates of discharge. SOLDIERS STONED.
Hazelton, Pa., Oct. 8.—The First Regiment from Philadelphia in command of Col. Bowman, arrived here this morning from that city. The only incident of the trip was the stoning of the train, bearing the section of the command, near Bethlehem. Several car windows were shattered, but no one was injured. The regiment will be concentrated at a central point and details will be sent by railroad or trolley to collieries where their services may be required.

MOVEMENTS OF MILITIA.
Philadelphia, Oct. 8.—The entire first brigade, under command of Brigadier-General John W. Schall, will be in camp in the anthracite coal regions before sunset tonight. The first city troop, the last of the command to get under way, left here this morning for the Panther Creek Valley. The First and Second Regiments, accompanied by details of the Light Battery A, departed for the coal fields at midnight. The First Regiment will camp at Hazelton, Luzerne County, and the Second will be quartered at New Philadelphia, Schuylkill County.

The Third Regiment, first city troop and a portion of the Sixth Regiment left this morning for the anthracite region. The additional battalions of the Sixth, which are located in Montgomery and Chester counties will join their regiment en route.

The Third Regiment will be quartered at Minersville, Schuylkill County, while the Sixth Regiment and First city troop will be scattered through the Panther Creek Valley in Schuylkill and Carbon counties.

The first brigade numbers nearly 8,000 men.

DRIVER BOYS REFUSE TO WORK.
Shamokin, Pa., Oct. 8.—Two companies of the Third Regiment were entitled to a war gratuity according to rank, in addition
