# THIS DOCTOR HAD NERVE STEEL TRUST ENJOINED

Cases End Fatally.

New York, Oct. 30. - With a growth underneath his tongue that two of the most eminent surgeons in New York has diagnosed as cancer, which would certainly produce death within eight months unless immediately operated on, Andrew Murray stood before a mirror in his office, and with a knife he had used in performing operations on dumb brutes, cut away the affected parts of the tongue with his own steady hand.

Murray is the superintendent of the advertising department for a big drygoods house. Among his accomplishments he numbers a thorough knowledge of veterinary surgery. When his disease was pronounced by Drs. George R. Fowler and A. Warner Shepard to be cancer, Murray had ideas of his own, and declared his trouble was merely a fibrous growth under his tongue.

He agred to undergo an operation, to be performed by Dr. Fowler on Oct. 21. but he failed to appear at the time appointed, and instead became his own surgeon. Tightly holding his tongue between his teeth, Murray cut away its diseased parts. He then wrapped his neck in camphorated flan-nel, and has not lost a day from his business office, although the operation was exceedingly painful when performed without the use of anaes-

When Dr. Shepard was informed of Murray's act he said: "'He may live more than eight months, but such cases are fatal in the end. It may his days to think he is not going to die."

Aspinwall Hodge and others to prevent the United States Steel Corporation from retiring \$200,000,000 of preferred stock, and issuing \$250,000,000 in bonds. The decision says: "I will advise that a preliminar, injunction be granted restraining the issue of bonds upon the terms that if the defendant desire to appeal, the complainant

shall consent that the cause be set down for hearing at the next term of the court of errors and appeals." Vice-Chancellor Emery decides that the meeting of the directors at which the resolution to retire the stock was adopted was prematurely called and that the retirement of the stock must be therefore enjoined.

The decision of the vice-chancellor agrees with the decision of the court of errors and appeals in the Berger case, on all other points.

#### To Train Asylum Attendants. Toronto, Oct. 30.-Hon. J. R. Strat-
