Gigantic Fortune Falls to a Sister of Mercy.

Des Moines, Ia., Jan. 26. — Sister Philomena, mother superior of Mercy Hospital, has just learned that she is heir to one-fifth of an estate of \$15,000,000.

The estate is that of an uncle, John McCormick, who died in Melbourne, Australia, ten years ago. McCormick owned several gold mines, sheep ranches and other property.
