

Mr. Judd has served the city, off and on, for some years, as alderman, library trustee, and water commissioner. He is a lawyer by profession, and solicitor for the Grand Trunk, the

Electric Company (of which he is also a shareholder), the Bell Telephone Company, and the Barber Asphalt Company. In the municipal campaign last year it was argued by his newspaper supporter that Mr. Judd, being a corporation lawer, was more competent

than Dr. Campbell to deal with corporations doing business with the city, This view was not accepted by the electors, and Mr. Judd met defeat, although backed by an efficient party organization.

Should the question of Niagara Power come to the front next year, as is expected, the rights of the London Electric Company, under the provisions of the Conmee act, would be a matter for consideration by the council. Mr. Judd, as a shareholder of the company, would, if he were in the mayor's chair, be placed in a most embarrassing position. The electors should see to it that he is saved from this predicament.
