LONDONER BEATEN AND ROBBED WAS PLAYING POKER IN DETROIT

Frank Flannigan Had \$50 in His Pockets
When He Reached
City of Straits.

SLUGGED BY A BAD GANG

Reported Matter to Police, and
Is Now Seeking the Saloon
Where Row Occurred.

Detroit, Mich., May 26.—Frank Flannigan, a butcher, of London, was beaten and robbed by four men while playing poker in a Detroit saloon last night. Flannigan came to Detroit yesterday with \$50 tucked away in an inside pocket, and he intended to see the sights as they exist in a big town. He had not been here very long before he met a man that was more than friendly to him and volunteered to show him around.

Last night a poker game was suggested and Flannigan readily consented. The game started off at five cents, but the stakes were raised and raised until the ceiling was the limit. As one jackpot was won after another by Flannigan, and the money began rolling his way, the Londoner was more than elated, and purchased liquid refreshments like a sailor on shore leave.

Finally there was a big jackpot in eight and Flannigan as usual won it. As he started to reach for it one of the gamblers struck his hand with something that nearly severed one of his fingers, but Flannigan managed to hold on to the money.

Then other persons in the room began beating him, and finally he was rendered unconscious, and his money, all but \$5, was taken away from him. Flannigan recovered consciousness in a short time, but his new friends were missing. He went to the sixth precinct police station and Police Surgeon Thomas sewed up several wounds on his face and his head, and he was allowed to remain at the station all night.

Today he is with officers trying to find the saloon where he was beaten and robbed, in the hopes of getting some trace of the gambler robbers.

Frank Flannigan is well known in London. With his family he resides on William street north. His wife did not know where he had gone, and today was seeking him in this city.

Some South Londoner is today minus a wig and a hat. The two top-story accessories just mentioned were found yesterday morning in the backyard of a well-known Elmwood avenue citizen.

"Oh, for heaven's sake," said the man, "don't do that. Throw me out a hat. I've lost mine, and am nearly frozen. I'll go away at once if you do."

The citizen got an old "lid" and threw it out, and the man went away. In the morning the citizen started out to his garden, and was surprised to find a handsome dark wig lying among the vegetables and nearby was a hat. His adventure of the early morning and the sounds he had heard during the night flashed back to his mind, and the visitor's need for a hat was at once apparent.

AUTO VEHICLES WOULD CUT DOWN EXPENSES

Patrol and Ambulance of This
Type Favored by Chief
Williams.

Chief Williams is strongly of the opinion that it will not be long before London will require an automobile patrol and ambulance.

"If we had such vehicles," he stated to The Advertiser this afternoon, "they would save a great deal of expense. There is no better ambulance anywhere than we have now, but if it were operated as an automobile it would go much faster and no time would be lost in hitching up. This would be particularly valuable in the case of the patrol wagon. A policeman for instance, fighting with some rough customer away out in any London East, thinks it is an age before the patrol wagon can get to him. You can get to places where there is trouble going on too fast. It would be far cheaper to operate an auto ambulance and patrol wagon than to keep the horses we have to keep now."

The chief states that auto wagons and ambulances are very rapidly displacing the vehicles drawn by horses in all the big cities, and from what he has learned they are giving every satisfaction.

COLONEL MUNRO ON TRIAL TODAY

Charged With Making False
Returns of Farmers' Bank.

Traverses ON THE STAND
Says That President Had Nothing To
Do With Preparation of the
Figures.

Toronto, May 25.—Col. Munro, the president of the ill-fated Farmers' Bank, appeared before Judge Winchester this morning, to answer the charge of making false returns to the Government. In all there are eleven charges covering eleven months. Mr. H. E. Dewar, on behalf of his client, waived reading of a number of new charges, pleaded not guilty, and elected to be tried by his honor.

Traverses a Witness.
Mr. Traverses, the convicted manager of the bank, was the first witness called by the crown. Traverses identified the signature of the president, Col. Munro, on the monthly statement to the Minister of Finance for January, 1910. The statement was prepared by Mr. Fitzgibbon, the accountant, and witnesses went over the figures. Mr. Munro had nothing to do with the preparation of the figures. He was not at the bank other than three times a month. The president would ask a question often about the bank's investments, but that was all. Witness had discussed the Keeley mine with the president. Mr. Munro told Traverses that he had received a letter from some person challenging the investment in the Keeley mine, but they did not go into the figures.

The manager assured the court that all the bank had in the Keeley mine was fully secured. At that time the bank had about \$50,000 invested in the property.

Mr. Monahan, county court attorney, stated that he was going into the figures in the monthly statement for the purpose of showing what the president might have done to detect the falsity of the figures in the statement to which he had offered his signature.

Mr. Traverses explained a number of misleading items, and falsely entered items in the statements. Mr. Dewar was anxious to expedite the case and was willing to make any admission that might facilitate the court's work.

Mr. Monahan, continuing the examination of Traverses, asked if information as to the actual composition of the various items in the false statement could have been easily ascertained at the head office.

Traverses—Oh, yes. An officer of the bank, such as the president, could easily have got any information he wanted. If the statement had not included the Keeley mine stock, it would have shown a serious impairment of the bank's capital.

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YOUTHFUL MONTREAL SLAYER COLLAPSES ON SCAFFOLD

Carried Bodily to Gallows in Hysterical Condition and Supported
While Noose Is Adjusted—Pays Penalty for
Murdering Fellow Countryman.

Montreal, May 26.—Francesco Creola, 20 years old, paid the penalty at eight o'clock at the Montreal jail for the murder of Louiseppe Chino. He was the first Italian to be hanged in the province of Quebec.
Creola, or Giuseppe Grenora, his real name, as the hour of death approached, became pitifully hysterical, and at the last had to be carried bodily up the scaffold, and supported while the rope was adjusted and the last of his life was carried out. He utterly collapsed at the last.
The hangman was the same man who officiated at the execution of Timothy Candy. One hundred policemen guarded the vicinity of the jail to guard against any unseemly incident, and all passed off smoothly. At eight o'clock exactly the hangman drew the bolt, and Creola's body shot through the trap. His neck was broken, and death was instantaneous.

BORDEN ELECTION STORY IS A CALL FOR FUNDS

Conservative Press Reports of Voting Sent Out For the Purpose
of Stirring Up Party—Some "Ifs" Still To Be
Taken Into Account.

Ottawa, May 26.—The story sent to the Conservative press yesterday, emanating from the Opposition leader, to the effect that Parliament will be dissolved on Sir Wilfrid's return from England, and a general election held in September on any facts that would warrant so definite a statement. The political outlook is still practically unchanged from what it was when Sir Wilfrid left for the Imperial Conference a fortnight ago. Parliament will reassemble on July 18, and what will happen then is conditional largely on the American's Senate's action in regard to ratifying the agreement and on the attitude of the opposition with regard to persisting in their announced determination of refusing supply and refusing to let the will of the majority at Parliament prevail on the reciprocity proposals of the Government.

MOCHA TEMPLE SHRINERS ARE TREKKING OVER THE SANDS

Nobles From Many Places Are Arriving in London for the
Ceremonial Session—A Parade of the Arab Patrol.

The Shriners are coming into the city in large numbers today for the ceremonial session being held this afternoon and evening.
Nobles from Chatham, Windsor, Sarnia, Stratford, Brantford, Hamilton, St. Thomas, Toronto, Buffalo, Chicago, and other cities have already arrived, and the evening trains will bring a still larger number.
Thirty-five candidates will be put over the hot sands tonight, and there will be fun to burn.
There will be a parade of the Arab patrol tonight at 7 o'clock. Capt. A. E. Somerville has spent much time in drilling the patrol, and they are in fine fettle.

The afternoon session was devoted almost entirely to business. The new by-laws were introduced and considered. Much routine business was disposed of, walk, where it was brought to a standstill by the wagon catching fast on the hydrant.
Fruit which had not yet been delivered, was scattered over the street, and the horse was more or less scratched and bruised.

DRIVER THROWN AGAINST CURB

Thomas Mascari Had Close Call
From Serious Injury in
a Runaway.

Animal Used Its Heels With Great
Effect When It Became Frightened
at an Engine.

Thomas Mascari, a Clarence street young man, narrowly escaped serious injuries when he was thrown from the delivery wagon of A. Mascari, wholesale fruit merchant, on the cement curb on Dundas street at the corner of Rectory, this morning.

The horse became badly frightened at an engine which was shunting at the G. T. R. crossing on Rectory street, and dashed down the street towards Dundas, in the meantime using its heels with good effect on the dashboard of the wagon.

The driver retained his hold on the reins, but with the animal kicking so furiously and galloping, he could do little to curb its speed.
At Dundas street Mascari undertook to turn west, but the wagon struck a telephone post on the southwest corner and he was thrown with great force on the cement curb of the street. His leg was badly bruised, but he did not sustain any more serious injuries.

After overturning the wagon several times, the front wheel of which had been wrenched off and demolished, the horse leaped over the fire hydrant on the same corner clear onto the sidewalk.

APPOINT A COMMISSION TO PROBE MORAL CONDITIONS

Meeting Last Night in St. Andrew's Hall Decided to Ask the
Mayor to Investigate Statements as to
Children of This City.

At the second meeting held in St. Andrew's schoolroom in connection with the question of moral conditions among children, those present last night, after further discussion, passed the following resolution:
"Resolved, that we representing the city council, board of education, Medical Association, Ministerial Alliance, Teachers' Association, Mothers' Clubs, Women's Christian Temperance Union, Women's Council, Children's Aid Society, Charities Organization, Y. M. C. A., the press, together with a number of representative citizens, in all to the number of about one hundred residents of the city of London, having discussed the moral condition of our city, particularly among the young, feel the question is of sufficient gravity to justify us in requesting his worship the mayor to appoint a commission, consisting of men and women who command the respect and confidence of the public at large, to investigate the whole question, to report, and if the conditions warrant, to advise a remedy."

A committee consisting of Rev. Dr. Ross, Principal Waller, Inspector Edwards, and Miss Stella Macklin was appointed to present the resolution to the mayor.

MAYOR BEATTIE HAS REFUSED TO APPOINT A COMMISSION

His Worship Declines To
Go Into Mrs. Thornley's
Statements.

LET IT DIE OUT, HE SAYS

Legally Mayor Says He Has No
Power To Do as Deputation
Asked.

"I will not name a commission to hear the charges of immorality brought by Mrs. May R. Thornley. I have no power under the statute to do so, and I furthermore doubt the advisability of such a course, had I such power. We would listen to a lot of filth that would become public, making conditions much worse than they are at the present time. I have no desire to further injure the name of this city."

The above statement was made by Mayor Beattie at noon today to the deputation consisting of Rev. Dr. Ross and Inspector Edwards, who appeared before his worship to present the resolution carried at the meeting in St. Andrew's Hall last night. There was a sharp encounter between Inspector Edwards and Principal Waller during the interview.

Dr. Ross presented the petition to Mayor Beattie. He stated that the meeting had decided to ask his worship to name a commission to go into the charges thoroughly.

"We are quite aware of the fact that you have no power under statute to appoint a commission," said Dr. Ross. "However, as first citizen of London, we were of the opinion that you could name such a body of men to hear the evidence, and arrive at some conclusions that would be helpful to the morals of the city. It would not be necessary to take evidence under oath."

"I have no power whatever to name a commission," said his worship. "Anything that you suggest would be wide of the mark. What good would a commission be if the men composing it could not hear evidence under oath, and conduct a cross-examination? It would merely be a farce, with no good resulting whatever. I will not name a commission. You can go to the council, if you will, but I will not take upon myself the responsibility of appointing such a body. I do not think it fair, nor just."

Legal Difficulties.
"I do not think the council have anything to do with the matter," continued Dr. Ross. "It is a matter for you to decide. This motion was passed by the meeting last night, and was considered at some length. We are fully aware, as I said before, of the legal difficulties in the way, but a man with your legal training and position could name a body of men who could hear the charges without bias, and come to some definite conclusion. We want to arrive at some method of improving conditions."

Principal Waller made a few suggestions, saying that they wished to evolve some constructive policy that would lead to the protection of the young people, the boys and girls of the community.

Not Hunting Evil.
"We have no desire to hunt evil," said the principal. "Rather do we wish to evolve something of a constructive nature that will better protect our young people in schools, in factories and elsewhere. That is our desire. There are some, quite a number in fact, who do not wish to send their children to the public schools, where they will mingle in mixed crowds, and become contaminated with the evil that is in the world."

"I will not listen to such trash about the public schools," answered Inspector Edwards. "My children attended public school, and I will not have them insulted." Dr. Ross's children went to the public schools. Mayor Beattie's children are going to public schools, and they are none the worse for that. I will not have it said that any children will be contaminated by going to school with them. It's trash."

Was Misunderstood.
"I am sorry that you misunderstood me," said Principal Waller. "I did not mean exactly what the Inspector said. We merely want to evolve something constructive to prevent evil, and preventing the children and young people in the city from becoming contaminated with vice."

"Nothing will be gained by discussing the matter," said Dr. Ross. "We did not come to argue but to present our petition."

The legality of the appointment of a commission was again taken up. Mayor Beattie looking up the municipal act, continued on Page Eight.

TAKES BENCH ON JUNE FIRST

Sir James Whitney Has Announced the Appointment of
Mr. J. C. Judd, K. C.

NEW P. M. OF LONDON
Mr. A. H. M. Graydon, the Deputy Police Magistrate, is Spoken Highly of by Attorney-General Foy.

It has been officially announced that Mr. J. C. Judd, K. C., has been named police magistrate to succeed the late P. M. Frank Love. He will commence his duties on June 1.

Sir James Whitney made the announcement in Toronto Thursday afternoon, and the official documents are now on their way to London.

The appointment was made on the understanding that Mr. Judd would give up his private practice.

On June 1, Acting Magistrate A. H. Marshall Graydon will relinquish the position now held by him for five months. During that time, Mr. Graydon has had a large number of cases of importance to decide, and in all he has given the utmost satisfaction.

Hon. J. J. Foy, attorney-general, has expressed his appreciation of the services of Mr. Graydon, and has declared that he has been most satisfied in the position.

This sentiment prevails in London. The citizens generally being loud in their praise of the efficient services rendered by Mr. Graydon. Chief Williams, the legal fraternity, and others are well satisfied with him. He has won a reputation for fairness and broadmindedness during his occupancy of the bench.

The New Magistrate.
Mr. Judd, the new magistrate, was born in London on Feb. 1, 1864. He was educated in the public schools here, later graduating from the Collegiate Institute and Osgoode Hall. He matriculated in 1881, and was articled to Mr. Edmund Meredith, K. C. He served as student with Meredith & Meredith, and when called to the bar in 1886, he entered into partnership with the firm, and has been connected with them ever since.

He has been twenty years in public life. In 1891 he was elected alderman for South London, and was re-elected the following year. Although defeated in 1893 he was elected again in 1894, and was chairman of the finance committee.

From 1895 to 1897 he was a member of the board of water commissioners, serving as chairman in 1896. From 1898 to 1902 he was a member of the library board, being chairman in 1901 and 1902.

In 1903 and 1904 he was an alderman, and chairman of the finance committee.

Was Mayor of London.
The following year, 1905, he ran for the mayoralty, being defeated by Dr. C. I. Campbell by 23 votes. In 1906 he was elected over Mr. S. Stevelly, and was returned by acclamation in 1907. From 1908 to the present time he has been a member of the hospital trust, and was chairman last year and this.

In 1909 Mr. Judd ran for the House of Commons for South Middlesex, but was defeated by Mr. Malcolm McEwan, M. P. ardent.
