COBALT TRAIN TURNS TURTLE AND ROLLS DOWN EMBANKMENT

Coupling Chain Catches in Frog and Special Is Ditched Near
Utterson—Passengers Camp Out Beside Wreck.

North Bay, Aug. 11.—The Cobalt special train, which left Toronto last night at 8:30, was ditched one mile out of Utterson at 2 o'clock this morning. A coupling chain between cars was dragging and caught in a frog on a switch, derailing every car but the rear special. The train was running slowly, and injuries were few and not serious.

DRUNKEN MAN FIRED HIS HOUSE AND BRUTALLY ASSAULTED WIFE

Thomas Murray Taken Into Custody at Instance of Mrs. Murray
—Home at London Junction Was Completely Destroyed.

As a result of a fire which destroyed a house yesterday afternoon in London Junction, which he and his wife occupied, Thomas Murray, a carpenter, formerly of West London, is lodged in jail on a charge of arson and assault, and his wife lies in the hospital with a broken jaw which she claims Murray caused by striking her when she tried to extinguish a fire he had started in the house.

According to Mrs. Murray, her husband came home in an ugly mood and started to abuse her. He had been drinking, but was not in a drunken condition. He went into a bedroom and set fire to a bed-tick, and when she went to put it out, he struck her on the jaw and began to choke her.

She broke away from him and ran over to a neighbor for assistance, but while she was away it is supposed he again set fire to the house.

Afraid of Murray.
Although Mrs. Murray's jaw was broken in three places and she was hardly able to speak, she ran to Mr. Geo. Wallace's place and asked him to come over and help her. Knowing Murray's reputation, Mr. Wallace was unwilling to do so, as he was afraid Murray would come over and burn his house down.

Mrs. Murray then ran to the signal tower, where the Grand Truck and C. P. R. track crosses, and telephoned for the police.

Later she came down to Crown Attorney McKillop's office and he sent her to Dr. Seaborn's office, where she was ordered to the hospital. Before going, however, she insisted on coming down to the court house and swearing out a warrant against her husband.

Taken Into Custody.
In answer to the telephone call, Constables Northgreaves and Sadler went out, but the house was burned to the ground, and they would not arrest Murray without a warrant. Later Constable Hughes went out, and locating him in a hotel, placed him under arrest. He was not drunk at the time, and offered no resistance. It was stated that he disclaimed all knowledge of the fire, but this is only conjecture, as there was no (Continued on Page Twelve.)

COMMANDER OF NIOBE SURRENDERS HIS SWORD

Rumored That Court-Martial
May Follow Stranding
of Cruiser.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—A special dispatch from Halifax says: "A pathetic scene is reported to have been witnessed in the dockyard yesterday. Commander W. B. McDonald, of H. M. C. S. Niobe, proceeded in full uniform, wearing his sword, to the office of Admiral Kingsmill. When he returned his sword was left by his side. It has been left with the admiral as the result of the stranding of his ship. Nothing is given out regarding this, and the occurrence is what is reported in the dockyard, but it was the first step in a court-martial, which was in line with such an investigation which may mean the loss of his command of the Canadian cruiser. Deputy Minister Desbarrats, of the naval department, stated today that there was no confirmation of the rumor from Halifax, and that he believed it was untrue.

9,500 TICKETS WERE SOLD AT LONDON FOR I. B. S. PICNIC

Crowd at Lakeside on Thursday Surpassed Any Congregation
of People Ever Seen at the Old Time Resort—Outing
May Go to Sarnia Next Year.

The official returns of the railway and traction company show that slightly more than 9,500 people were carried to Port Stanley for the I. B. S. picnic.

This morning all that is left of the house is a pile of ashes, but the barn is still standing, and the neighbors are taking care of the chickens through which Mrs. Murray eked out a slender pittance.

AGREE ON RATE ON RAW WOOL

It is said that Smith claimed that he had some difficulty in his finances under the arrangement between London and Toronto. He says he was very well treated here and that he was satisfied with the London management, but that matters could have been improved from the Toronto Club's standpoint.

Smith stated that he intended to go home to New York, but after giving the matter better consideration he decided to consult Manager Minihnick and report back to Toronto.

London, Aug. 11.—The government announced this afternoon that they had taken all necessary steps, military and otherwise, to safeguard London's food supply in any emergency. A curious side was afforded when vans issued from the grounds of Buckingham Palace closely guarded by police, more waggons contained the baggage of the King who has gone to Yorkshire. It was feared strikers might intercept the royal effects.

CLEVELAND MAN LIKES FOREST CITY

Mr. W. L. Eggers, superintendent of the House of Correction, Cleveland, Ohio, is visiting at the home of Miss Lewis, 253 Oxford street. With Mr. Eggers are Mr. and Mrs. William F. Fretz, Mrs. Fretz being a sister of Miss Lewis.

The city of Cleveland has for some time had a city prison and farm where it deals with its criminals in the most humane and modern methods. A very large number of these are inebriates and minor offenders, who experience great moral improvement under the helpful influence of the farm. During the past year there were not less than 500 prisoners paroled, and out of this number 86 per cent "made good," and on being given their freedom commenced to lead entirely different lives.
