BASEBALL SEASON BIDS LONDON FAREWELL TODAY

Prospects for Next Season Look Bright—Lew McAllister the Likely Choice for Manager—London Will Not Be Much Affected by Draft It Is Thought.

London fans will bid good-bye to the baseball season of 1912 today, when the final games in the London-St. Thomas post-season series will be played. Today's games should prove interesting, as London needs both of them to carry home the championship of the two cities. Sammy Smith will work in the first contest, and if he is right, there will be nothing to it but London. Hynes or Fitzpatrick will work in the second game, with Fitzpatrick the probable choice.

Not a Very Successful Season.
Although the 1912 season has not been a very successful one from the London fans' standpoint, great things are expected next season, and with a proper manager at the helm, the material already available should form the nucleus of a good ball team. With one or two exceptions the present London team will be intact when the season comes around again next spring, and the local directors will leave no stone unturned next year in an endeavor to put London on top of the Canadian League and keep it there.

The New Manager.
Just who next year's manager will be has not been definitely decided, but it will probably lay between Louis Cook and Lew McAllister. Both are anxious to come here, and the chances are that if reasonable terms can be made with either, he will be the choice. It is not certain whether Cook will be able to get away from Ottawa and his release would have to be bought. The Ottawa club have already signified their intention of holding out big price for him, and it is not likely the local directors will attempt to make a deal for him.

McAllister the Probable Choice.
With McAllister it is different. He can secure his release any time he wants to go, and as he is exceedingly anxious to come to London on account of this city being so near Detroit, his home town, it is probable he will hold a conference with the local directors as soon as the International League season ends. He is just the kind of a manager that London needs, and with him in charge the outlook for 1913 would appear rosy indeed.

The Drafting Season.
It is not likely that the Canadian League will lose many players by draft, and the majority of clubs will start the 1913 season with much the same line-ups as they finished the season just ended.

As far as the London season is concerned it is doubtful whether any of the players will be drafted. Hynes was spoken of as a likely candidate for faster company, but every big league scout who visited the city this summer passed him up after having a look at him during a game. Fox and Linneburn were looked upon with favorable eyes, but it is thought that they will be allowed to remain with London for another season and then will be purchased. Bierbauer is also mentioned as a player who will be drafted, and it is not unlikely that Looney will go up.

"POP" GEERS WON AT HARTFORD RACES

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 6.—"Pop" Geers, the veteran driver, after playing in hard luck in two races, carried off the honors at Charter Oak Park this afternoon behind the Dud Archdale in the free-for-all championship trot. He won the big race, heading Billie Burke, the favorite, in straight heats. While this was the track event of the afternoon in the Grand Circuit meet, it was not nearly as spectacular nor did it arouse the interest displayed in the 2:09 trot, which went to six heats in order to produce a winner.

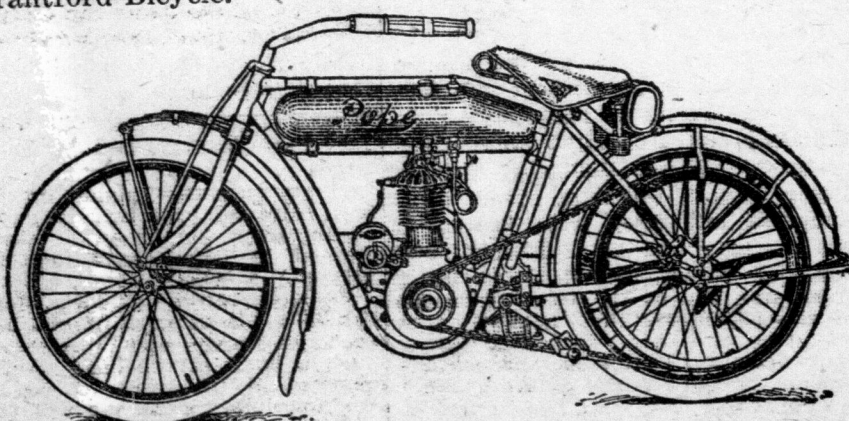
